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PREFACE

The Japanese Familiarization and Short Term (FAST) Course is one of a series of similar foreign language courses produced at the Foreign Service Institute that are intended to train U.S. Government pesonnel assigned to overseas posts. The objective of the FAST Courses is to help students acquire the communication skills necessary to deal with the most common social and daily life situations they will encounter during their overseas assignments. Language forms adequate to satisfy personal needs, "how-to" information, and cultural highlights are presented in a format that will encourage students to try out and use with confidence the language skills they have developed.

The original version of the Japanese FAST Course was drafted in 1981 by Tetsuo Kumatoriya and Mari Takahashi under the direction of Madeline E. Ehrman. These materials were edited in 1985 by John B. Ratliff, III, and Hedy A. St. Denis. Based on observation of student performance and comments of both students and instructors at FSI, the course has been extensively revised over the past several years. Mrs. Tomoko Tanaka Campen, Senior Instructor in the FSI Japanese Section, has been deeply involved in this work along with the team of instructors that she heads: Miyuki Fogel, Masako Gonzales-Montero, Masako Nanto, and Setsuko Pfeiffer. Thomas E. Madden assisted with the design and lay-out of the camera-ready copy and Cornelius C. Kubler was responsible for the editing of the final version of the course.

The Japanese FAST Course was designed as a six-week introductory course for employees and dependents with imminent assignments to Japan who are unable to take the regular 44-week Japanese Basic Course. It should be noted that the FAST Course does not attempt to present a systematic, comprehensive introduction to Japanese grammar; instead, bits and pieces of the grammar are practiced and explained as they appear naturally in the dialogs. In view of the emphasis on the immediately practical and the amount of time available, all linguistic explanations have been greatly simplified.

INTRODUCTION TO JAPAN AND THE JAPANESE LANGUAGE

USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. Do the Japanese understand English?

Almost all Japanese study English for six years in junior and senior high school, and many for two or more years in college.

Therefore, almost all Japanese know some English. However, few can use it for conversational purposes.

Although a large number of English words are currently used in Japanese, as we have seen, the pronunciation of these words is Japanized in such a way that they are usually unrecognizable to foreigners (and the same words usually cannot be understood by Japanese when spoken by a native speaker of English).

Therefore, when you need to communicate with a Japanese person in English, try to pick a student or a younger person whose memory of English is likely to be fresh, or write down what you want to say, for many Japanese find it easier to understand English when it is written than when it is spoken.

Generally speaking, most Japanese working at the Embassy or consulates do understand English. However, you will find the Japanese you will learn in this course to be very useful and all Japanese will much appreciate the effort you have made to learn their language.

2. Japanese names

A Japanese name consists of the family name and the given name, in that order. The family name is far more frequently used in Japanese than in English. First names are usually used only among intimates. Ordinarily, the Japanese do not have middle names. Names in Japanese are almost always written in Chinese characters or Kanji, and certain Kanji are frequently used in common Japanese names. Therefore, it will be easier for you to recognize Japanese names if you know these Kanji.

For example, what do the following names have in common?

Yamada Yamanaka Yamamoto Yamashita

The common part yama is represented by the Kanji \coprod , whose meaning is 'mountain.' Most Japanese names are written with two Kanji, and \coprod is one of the most common ones.

Another common Kanji used in names is \boxplus 'rice field', which is usually read as ta or da. Tanaka, Yamada and Nakata are examples of names that contain this Kanji.

Try writing the name Yamada. What do you think it means?

The following are some other common Kanji used in family names:

Female given names are often recognizable by the presence of ko (子) 'child' at the end of the name. Many male names end in o (男,夫) 'man,' 'husband,' 'male,' etc.

The following are some common given names that contain these sounds:

female: Kazuko Yasuko Kimiko male: Kazuo Yasuo Kimio

Needless to say, there are many other given names that do not end in ko or o.

Although Kanji have their own independent meanings, these meanings are not ordinarily recognized consciously when used in Japanese names. The same is true in English. For example, an English speaker would not think a person named Miller actually runs a mill. Likewise, English speakers do not necessarily think of the color 'green' when they meet a person named Green.

3. Forms of address

When a Japanese addresses a person, s/he usually adds some title after the person's name. Among the titles, san is the most common and is used regardless of the person's sex and marital status. It is translated into English as 'Mr.,' 'Mrs.,' or 'Ms.,' depending on the context. San can be used in the following three ways, depending upon the circumstances:

| 1. | Family name + san | e.g. | Tanaka-san |

| 3. | Family name + first name + san | e.g. | Tanaka Yasuko-san |

Of the above three patterns, the first one is the most common among adults. You can use this pattern with your colleagues, your friends' wives, etc.

The second pattern implies an intimate relationship and is used between very close friends and family members. For example, a wife often addresses her husband by his given name plus san. Therefore, if an American woman addresses a Japanese man by his given name (just trying to be friendly, for example), she may risk some misunderstanding by him or any other Japanese who happen to be present.

As a foreigner, it would be a good idea for you to use only the first pattern until you have observed enough to find out exactly when it is all right to use another pattern. It is not uncommon for two Japanese who have been friends for many years to address each other by their last names, especially when the friendship was established in adulthood. So the chances are you will be using only the first pattern (family name + san) and seldom have occasion to use any other pattern.

The third pattern is the most formal of the three and the least frequently used. It is used when a full name is required (e.g., when an instructor calls the roll in his/her first class).

Sensee, which literally means 'teacher,' can also be used as a term of address. It is used not only with teachers but also with professors, doctors, lawyers, politicians and other professionals. It is usually attached to the family name, e.g., Tanaka-sensee, but can also occur alone, as in the following:

Sensee, ohayoo gozaimasu. Good morning, Doctor (Professor, etc.).

Please note that ...san can never be used alone and must always follow a personal name or occupation. When referring to yourself, never add a title to your name, for the title is a way of showing politeness or respect to the listener or the person you are talking about.

4. Greetings

Ohayoo gozaimasu corresponds to 'Good morning' in English. Ohayoo is a casual form of the expression and is often used among friends and colleagues. Konnichiwa corresponds to 'Good afternoon' or 'Good day' in English, and is used between late morning and a little before dusk. Konbanwa corresponds to 'Good evening.' The above expressions are usually used only on the first encounter of the day. Sayoonara (or Sayonara)_corresponds to 'Goodbye' in English and implies that the two people will not meet again the same day. Strictly speaking, Japanese does not have an expression for 'How are you?,' although it has the expression Ogenki desu ka?, which literally means 'Are you healthy?'

The difference between the two is that the Japanese expression is said to a person the speaker has not met for some time, whereas in English you can say 'How are you?' to the same person every day. Another difference is that in English it would be a little odd to answer the question 'How are you?' with 'I feel terrible' or 'I have a headache', whereas in Japanese similar responses do not sound strange.

In other words, Ogenki desu ka? functions as a greeting and, at the same time, as an inquiry about one's health, while the English expression primarily functions as a greeting.

The response to Ohayoo gozaimasu, Konnichiwa, and Sayoonara is exactly the same as in English, i.e., you simply repeat the expression.

For Further Study

Notes on pronunciation

You will find Japanese pronunciation fairly simple, for there are fewer sounds in Japanese than in English and English has many of the Japanese sounds. However, certain features are not present in English. They include:

1. Sounds

Vowels: There are only five vowels in Japanese. They are

a: as in father but much shorteri: as in machine but much shorter

u: as in full but without rounding the lips

e: as in pet

o: as in boat but much shorter

Consonants:

Most Japanese consonants are pronounced almost the same as English consonants. The following sounds do not exist in English or occur in a different position in a word:

f: This sound is pronounced between the lips as when you try to blow out a candle but with a little rounding of the lips. It occurs only before u. It may sound more like h to you than f.

r: The pronunciation of this sound is between the t in water and the d in pudding.

n: This sound can be a syllabic nasal. 'Syllabic' means that the sound acts like a syllable by itself. (We will talk about Japanese syllables below.) It sounds like n in button. Before k or g it sounds like ng in sing.

ts: This sound is pronounced like ts in hats and nuts. Unlike English, the sound can occur at the beginning of a word in Japanese.

2. The Syllable

English speakers usually consider consonants and vowels as the basic units of pronunciation. Native speakers of Japanese, however, perceive syllables as the basic units of pronunciation.

Japanese syllables receive approximately equal stress and time no matter how many or how few consonants or vowels they contain. The simplest syllable consists of a single vowel and the most common type is composed of a consonant and a vowel.

You may find the following charts of Japanese syllables convenient. Note that the charts are read across, from left to right. The first symbol in each of the boxes outlined in heavy ink is romanization or romaji, the second is katakana, and the third is hiragana.

As mentioned above, a single vowel can be a syllable by itself. Vowel combinations like ai, ie, ue and long vowels like aa, ii, uu, ee, and oo should be considered as two syllables.

Not all syllables end in a vowel. The sound n can be a full syllable by itself. Similarly, when two identical consonants occur one after another, the first consonant is considered a full syllable. This is somewhat similar to the double consonant kk in bookkeeper in English.

You don't hear the sound of the first k in the word. It is like a momentary pause or silence with a tensing of the throat. In Japanese, this silence has the time duration of one syllable and is treated as such. For example, the word ikka 'family' is pronounced as i-(tense pause)-ka (three syllables). Other examples of double consonants follow:

tt: pronounced like tt in hot tea

itten one point

tch: pronounced like tch in hot chocolate

matchi match

ss: pronounced like ss in Jack's son, not like ss in kiss

issei first generation

ssh: pronounced like ssh in Miss Shepherd

isshoo one's life

pp: pronounced like pp in top position

ippai full

There is a difference in meaning between words with vowel combinations, long vowels, or double consonants on the one hand, and those with single vowels or single consonants on the other.

In any case, no matter how many vowels or consonants there are in the syllable, be sure to apply this general rule of Japanese pronunciation: 'Each syllable receives approximately equal stress and time.' The following are some examples:

In practicing the above words, you may find it helpful to beat in a metronomic fashion with your hand or a pencil, giving one full beat per syllable.

3. Accent

In English, accent is indicated by stress difference, which means the stressed syllable is pronounced louder than the other syllables.

In Japanese, accent is shown by pitch difference. Thus, in Japanese, instead of pronouncing one syllable louder, one or more syllables of a word are pronounced at a higher pitch than the rest. Japanese has numerous pairs of words which differ only in pitch. Compare:



However, such pitch differences seldom cause confusion in actual situations, for the context often tells you which word is meant by the speaker. You will find that pitch patterns differ according to regional dialects.



USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. Notes on the Writing System

In modern written Japanese, the following five kinds of symbols are used:

- 1. Kanji (Chinese characters)
- 2. Hiragana
- 3. Katakana
- 4. Romaji
- 5. Arabic numerals

About 90% of the characters used in Japanese sentences are Kanji and Hiragana.

1. Kanji

Although Japanese and Chinese are completely separate languages, Japanese adopted written symbols and much vocabulary from Chinese beginning in the 4th or 5th century A.D. These symbols or Chinese characters are called Kanji. Kanji represent both meaning and sound, and it is often the case that one Kanji has more than one reading (or pronunciation) and meaning. There are more than 45,000 Kanji. However, only 3,000 to 4,000 occur in daily use, of which 1,926 have been chosen as the most important. These 1,926 Kanji are the ones used in newspapers, magazines, and school textbooks (about 1,000 are taught in elementary school). In this text, you will learn to read and comprehend some of these Kanji. They are used in some names of persons, places, signs, etc., and knowledge of these Kanji will be useful for you in Japan.

2. Hiragana

Hiragana and Katakana are used to represent syllables (cf. Lesson 1: FOR FURTHER STUDY). The Hiragana were derived from the cursive style of Kanji and are used for native Japanese words, words that are not written in Kanji, etc. As you have seen in Practice 8, Hiragana are also used to show the reading or pronunciation of a Kanji when put above or to the side of the Kanji. This use of Hiragana is called Furigana.

3. Katakana

The Katakana syllabary is also derived from Kanji. It is more angular than Hiragana. The essential function of Katakana is exactly the same as Hiragana, i.e., to represent syllables. However, Katakana are mainly used for words of foreign origin and in telegrams. Thus, when you write your name in Japanese, you should write it in Katakana.

4. Romaji (Roman letters)

Since Romaji is taught in elementary school, most Japanese know it. However, its use in Japanese is very limited.

You will find Romaji in

- some road signs, station signs, store signs, etc
- some abbreviated foreign words, e g , PR, CM (commercial), YMCA

5 Arabic numerals and Kanji numerals

Numerals in Japanese are written in **Kanji** or Arabic figures. **Kanji** numerals are used when sentences are written vertically, while Arabic figures are used when they are written horizontally. (Scientific formulas are written only in Arabic numerals.) The following are examples of the usage of Arabic Numerals.

2. Particles

In Japanese, the roles participants play in actions and the relationships of words in sentences are usually indicated by markers called particles. In this lesson there are three particles, wa, ka and yo

The particle wa is a marker that indicates that the preceding word(s) or phrase is the topic of the sentence, i.e., the thing(s) or person(s) being talked about. For example, in Lesson 1, we studied the expression

Watakushi wa (name) desu. I'm (name)

The particle wa here indicates that the speaker is talking about him/herself (watakushi 'I') and makes the statement about the topic (him/herself) that his/her name is X

Lesson 2 Finding out where you are

Another particle taken up in this lesson is the particle ka, which indicates that the sentence preceding it is a question. We will have more to say about this particle below

The third particle yo, like ka, is a member of the small set of particles that occur at the end of a sentence. They express the speaker's attitude toward the contents of the preceding statement. The function of yo is to call the hearer's attention to the contents of the statement. Thus, the word is often translated as 'I tell you' or 'I assure you'. This particle is frequently used. However, since it carries a subtle nuance without changing the basic meaning of the statement, it will take some time to really get a 'feeling' for how to use it. Therefore, at present, just try to understand the basic function of yo when you hear it, but don't feel you must be able to use it.

3. <u>Ka</u> as a question marker

One of the areas where English and Japanese are not alike is the different ways in which question sentences are formed. Japanese is much simplar in this area, for all you need to do is add the word ka at the end of a statement. For example, in Lesson 1 we studied the expression Kore wa Tokyo desu., 'This is Tokyo', in locating a city (or area) on a map. If we place ka at the end of this sentence, we get a question sentence Kore wa Tokyo desu ka?, 'Is this Tokyo',' which we also studied in Lesson 1 Try making a similar question, 'Is this place the Ginza',' from Koko wa Ginza desu, 'This place is the Ginza' (The word koko means 'this place' We will talk more about this word below)

(Answer Koko wa Ginza desu ka?)

4. Koko wa (place name) desu ka? and Koko wa doko desu ka?

When you want to make sure you know where you are or when you want to ask where you are, you can use the following two questions

Koko wa Ginza desu ka?

Is this place the Ginza?

(Am I in the Ginza?)

Koko wa doko desu ka?

Where is this place?
(Where am I?)

As we studied in Lesson 1, responses to the first question usually begin with hai 'yes' (ee has the same meaning but is less formal than hai), or iie 'no.' Thus, if you listen for these words in the responses given by a Japanese person, you can at least guess pretty accurately whether the person answered your question negatively or affirmatively. (Of course, this does not mean that Japanese people will always use one of these words in their answers)

As for the answer to the second question, the Japanese usually say (*place name*) desu, as in the following example

Koko wa doko desu ka? Where is this place? Shinjuku desu. Shinjuku.

The main thing to remember when you ask a question with a word like doko 'where' (or 'who' or 'when', which come up later) is that the Japanese sentence structure (word order) is

not the same as the English word order. That is, a question like doko 'where' will usually come in the middle of the sentence, not at the beginning.

5. Moo ichido yukkuri itte kudasai. 'Please say it again slowly'

To any person who is not fully familiar with a language, native speaker speech sounds very fast. This is exactly what you will experience in Japan. Therefore, it will often be important for you to be able to ask the Japanese to repeat and slow down. You will find the expression Moo ichi-do yukkuri itte kudasai very helpful. The following is a rough sketch of the way the expression is constructed:

Moo ichi-do yukkuri itte kudasai.

one more time slowly please say

When you want to say 'Please speak slowly,' you can use the following expression:

Yukkuri itte kudasai.

Please say slowly.

Likewise, when you want to say 'Please say it again,' you can use the following expression:

Moo ichi-do itte kudasai.

Please say it again.

6. How to say 'thank you' in Japanese

One of the most common ways to say 'thank you' in Japanese is to use the expression Arigatoo. If you want to be a little more polite, you can say **Doomo** arigatoo (doomo is an intensifier). In a less formal situation, doomo can be used alone as an expression of gratitude.

7. Sumimasen 'Excuse me,' 'I'm sorry,' or 'Thank you'

In English, when you address a stranger in order to elicit some information (getting directions, for example), or when you want to get the attention of a clerk at a store, you first say 'Excuse me.' A comparable Japanese expression used for these purposes is Sumimasen. This expression can also be used when you want to apologize. For example, you can use it when you bump into a person on the street.

Another usage of this expression, which seems to be closely related to the way Japanese think, is to show gratitude. In Japanese, one way to show gratitude for a favor done for you is to say something like 'I'm sorry for the trouble you took for me,' Doomo sumimasen. We will study more about this usage in later lessons.



USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. 'this' and 'that'

When you refer or point to an object (or person), you often use 'this' and 'that' in English Japanese has the following three words

kore used for an object near the speaker (comparable to 'this') **sore** used for an object near the listener (comparable to 'that')

are used for an object away from the speaker and listener (comparable to

'that (one) over there')

When you want to know what the object you have in mind is called, you can ask the following question

Kore/sore/are wa nan desu ka? What is this/that/that over there?

2. How to say 'I'll take it' or 'I'll have it'

When you want to order a dish or buy some merchandise, you can use the following expression

Jaa, sore onegai shimasu.

Well, then, that one please

The word jaa means 'well (then)' and onegai shimasu literally means 'I make a request (for) ' and is comparable to 'please' in English

In place of sore in the above expression, you can use names of various objects or dishes For example, when you want to order sukiyaki, you can say

Sukiyaki onegai shimasu.

3. How to indicate acknowledgement

In English, you can sometimes say 'Is that right?' or the like to acknowledge that you have heard what another said without necessarily agreeing. Look at the following

Aa, soo desu ka?

Oh, is that so?/I see /Good

The expression looks like a question but is really an acknowledgement. It is used when you want to indicate that you've understood what was said.

4. 'I don't understand Japanese well.'

It may happen that you need to tell a Japanese person that you don't speak Japanese very well. You can use the following expression for this purpose.

(Yoku) Nihongo ga wakarimasen. I don't understand Japanese (well).
OR
Nihongo ga (yoku) wakarimasen.

In Lesson 1 you learned that wakarimasu means 'to understand.' The word wakarimasen in the above sentence is the negative form of wakarimasu.

5. How to find out the name of an object in Japanese

When you want to find out the name of an object in Japanese, you can use the following expression:

... wa Nihongo de nan desu ka? What is ... in Japanese?

For example, when you want to know the Japanese word for 'radio', you can say:

'Radio' wa Nihongo de nan desu ka? What is 'radio' in Japanese?

You can use the above question pattern whenever you want to ask the instructor Japanese words for objects you may need to know.

6. Particles ga and de

The particle ga ordinarily indicates that the preceding word or phrase is the subject of the sentence. Thus it is sometimes called the 'subject marker.' You will sometimes see ga used with words that are not translated into English as subjects, e.g., Nihongo ga wakarimasen, which is normally translated as 'I don't understand Japanese.' What this really means is 'Japanese is not understandable to me,' so ga really does mark the subject in this sentence as well.

The particle de has several meanings. The meaning in this lesson is 'in,' as in Nihongo de 'in Japanese.' Later (Lesson 10), we will see it also has the meaning of 'by means of,' as in basu de 'by bus.'

USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. How to ask about the existence of an object

The word arimasu means 'exist,' and this word can be used when you want to ask about the existence or availability of objects or merchandise. Look at the following.

... ga arimasu ka?

Is there

The above expression can mean 'Do you carry 2' or 'Do you have 2' Thus, in a pharmacy, if you want to ask whether they have aspirin, you can say:

Asupirin ga arimasu ka?

Do you have aspirin?

Likewise, when you want to ask if a hotel has a room available, you can say:

Heya ga arimasu ka?

Do you have a room (available)?

Please note that when you are talking about people, you should use imasu, not arimasu.

Example:

Kono heya ni Amerikajin ga imasu ka? Is there an American in this room?

2. How to ask about the location of an object, store, etc.

The expression kono chikaku ni means 'in this vicinity' or 'near here.' You can use it when you ask about the location of an object, store, etc., as in the following example

Kono chikaku ni depaato ga arimasu ka? Is there a department store near here?

3. How to find a person who understands English

A very good way to get help is to find a person who understands English. You can use the following expression for this purpose

Eego ga wakaru hito wa imasen ka?Isn't there a person who understands
English?

The word wakaru is a form of the verb wakarimasu, 'understand' While wakarimasu is used at the end of a sentence (in polite speech), wakaru is used in the middle of a sentence, as in the above example. The word hito means 'person,' and the phrase Eego ga wakaru hito means 'a person who understands English.' The word imasen is the negative form of imasu.

4. How to say 'Please write it here'

In getting directions to a place, you may want to ask a Japanese person to draw you a map. You can use the following expression for this purpose:

Chizu o kaite kudasai.

Draw me a map, please.

The word kudasai at the end of the above sentence is comparable to 'please' in English, and is used when you ask a person to do something for you. The phrase kaite kudasai means 'please write down' or 'please draw.' Thus, when you want to say something like 'Please draw a map here,' you can say:

Koko ni chizu o kaite kudasai.

Please draw a map here.

You may wonder what the difference is between . . . onegai shimasu, which you learned in Lesson 3, and . . . kudasai, because both can mean 'please' in English. Onegai shimasu is used when you place an order at a restaurant, order some merchandise at a store, etc. while . . . kudasai is used when you ask somebody to do something for you.

Compare the expressions in 1 and 2 below.

1. Are onegai shimasu. That one, please. Sukiyaki onegai shimasu. Sukiyaki, please.

2. Chizu o kaite kudasai. Draw (me) a map, please. Koko ni kaite kudasai. Write (it) here, please.

As the above examples indicate, onegai shimasu is used after some objects (e.g., are and sukiyaki in the above sentences), while kudasai is used after a word that indicates some action (e.g., kaite 'write/draw' in the above sentences).

1. Greeting expressions used in introductions

Hajimemashite. How do you do?

(lit, It's the first time [for me to meet you])

Doozo yoroshiku. Pleased to meet you

(lit, ask your favor [good treatment])

2. Particle no

As mentioned in the previous lesson, no occurring between two nouns indicates that what comes before the no describes what comes after it. Study these patterns

(work place) **no** (name)

Amerika Taishikan no Sumisu Smith of the American Embassy

(possessor) no (belonging)

watakushi no hon my book

3. Confirmation particle ne

The particle ne at the end of a sentence expresses something like 'aren't you?' or 'isn't it?' in English Thus, this particle can be used to confirm the name of a person to whom you are introduced Look at the following example

Yamada-san desu ne?

You're Mr Yamada, aren't you?

Depending on the pronoun and auxiliary, the confirmation question varies in English, e.g., 'isn't he,' 'don't they,' etc. In Japanese, ne is used no matter what the preceding sentence is

4. Kore vs. kochira

Kore and kochira are Japanese equivalents of English 'this'. They often refer to a person (or thing in the case of kore, cf. Lesson 3) that is near the speaker. The two words are, however, used differently in introducing people. Kore is used when introducing a person who is an in-group member (e.g., his family, his company), while kochira is used when introducing a person who is not a member of the speaker's group. Many times, the distinction between in-groupness and out-groupness becomes a determining factor in the use of words which have basically the same meaning, as in kore and kochira. As a rule, Japanese people use politer expressions when they deal with out-group members than when they deal with in-group members. In addressing out-group members, they may refer to in-group members as they would to themselves. In this regard, we can say kochira is a politer expression than kore in

introducing people, and kore is used only to introduce an in-group member. Thus, when you introduce an out-group member, for example a Mr. Tanaka, you should say Kochira wa Tanaka-san desu 'This is Mr. Tanaka.'

The in-group/out-group distinction is also reflected in the use of the terms of address you studied in Lesson 1. When you refer to yourself or in-group members, don't use the term -san after your name.

5. Kinship terms

Another instance of the in-group/out-group distinction shows up in the use of kinship terms. (In this case, in-group members are one's own family members and out-group members are another person's family members.)

6. Nihongo ga ojoozu desu ne. 'You speak Japanese very well.'

You may hear Japanese say to you Nihongo ga ojoozu desu ne, regardless of your real proficiency in Japanese. It's a compliment Japanese often make to foreigners, even beginners. The underlying assumption of the expression is that foreigners can't speak Japanese. Many foreigners too often take the expression literally (and sometimes emotionally) so that they feel offended or insulted, for they think the Japanese use the expression to ridicule them since they know their Japanese can't be that good. However, the fact is that the Japanese feel that one way to show politeness is to praise a person's ability.

The Japanese frequently use this expression as a 'starter' in conversations with foreigners. Such being the case, one should take the expression as a sort of greeting. Like in any other greeting, what counts is the fact that you use the expression, rather than its literal meaning. A good way to respond to this 'greeting' expression would be to say something like 'Oh, no, I'm still a beginner.' A comparable Japanese expression is lie, madamada desu. 'No, (I'm not good at it) yet.'

7. meeshi (名刺) 'calling card'

At the beginning of a business encounter, Japanese people almost always exchange meeshi ('calling card'), unless the people have met each other before. You may wonder why the meeshi is so important to the Japanese. The Japanese view all relations as hierarchical. It is rare that any two people will be perceived as true equals. Japanese usually adjust their verbal and nonverbal behavior to each other according to the social position of a person in this hierarchy, which characterizes almost all relations among the Japanese. The meeshi

Lesson 5 Introductions

provides the kind of information that helps people evaluate one's social position. It includes the following information:

- a. name of the company/agency
- b. person's position
- c. person's name
- d. address and telephone number of the company/agency

In some cases, the meeshi is written in Japanese on one side and in English on the other. You will probably get this type of meeshi at your post.

It should be noted that institutional affiliation usually carries more weight than position in the institution.

In exchanging meeshi, Japanese usually

- bow and
- make a few remarks concerning the other person's job, institution, etc., to show that the speaker is interested in the person.

Although most Japanese don't use any formula when presenting meeshi, it may be a good idea for you to say Kore wa meeshi desu, 'This is (my) calling card,' in order to let the person know that you are giving him/her your meeshi.


In this lesson, you will learn some more names of places and areas in Tokyo in addition to those you studied in Lesson 2. (You will learn some landmarks and street names of the Embassy area in later lessons.)

Look at the map of Tokyo below. The official name of the Tokyo jurisdiction is **Tokyo-to** (東京都; **to** literally means 'capital'). It consists of the Urban District, the Tama District and the Ogasawara Islands (not included on the map). As of l985, the population of **Tokyo-to** was approximately twelve million, representing approximately 10% of the entire population of Japan.

When people talk about Tokyo they often refer to the Urban District, which is composed of 23 wards or Ku (⊠). It is in this district where you find government offices, headquarters of major companies, museums, and the American Embassy and American Center. The Urban District is the center of political, economic, cultural, and educational activities in Japan. The Tama District, especially the areas near the Urban District, consist of satellite towns or what the Japanese call 'bed towns,' from which many people commute to downtown Tokyo.

The Ogasawara Islands came under U.S. control after World War II and were returned to Japan in 1968. The main industry there is fishing.

The areas marked (1), (2) and (3) on the map of the Urban District below will be covered in Practice 1.

USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. Some important words in getting directions

Japanese do not have a word for 'block,' so they frequently use the following words in giving directions

kado corner shingoo traffic light koosaten intersection

For example, when an American says 'Go two blocks,' a Japanese would say something like 'Go as far as the second intersection'. The following words are frequently used with the above three words

tsugi/saisho no (shingoo) the next/first (traffic light) the second (traffic light) mittsu-me no (shingoo) the third (traffic light)

The following are some more place expressions introduced in this lesson

(eki) no soba near (the station)
(eki) kara from (the station)

2. Is it A or B?

When the directions you get are rather complicated and you want to make sure that you got them correctly, you may want to ask a question like 'Is it on the right or left?' In Japanese, questions of this kind are formed by simply adding the phrase desu ka to each alternative Look at the following

English: Is it A or B?

Japanese: A desu ka, B desu ka?

In English, when there are three or more items to ask about, you place 'or' only in front of the last item. In Japanese, however, the sentence construction is the same as in the question that has two items. Compare the following

English: Is it A, B, or C?

Japanese: A desu ka, B desu ka, C desu ka?

Lesson 8 Getting the answer you want (1)

Thus, when you want to ask if the place you are looking for is in front of the station or behind the station, you can say:

Eki no mae desu ka, ushiro desu ka?

Is it in front of or behind the station?

3. Helpful things to know in getting directions

- a. When directions you have asked for are complicated and the place you are looking for is not far, Japanese will often take you there instead of giving you the directions. In such a case, s/he would say Tsurete itte agemashoo 'I'll take you there.' You should show your gratitude with an expression like Doomo arigatoo or Arigatoo gozaimasu, etc. (cf. Lesson 11)
- b. If your efforts to locate a place are in vain, try to find the nearest kooban 'police box' or tabako-ya 'tabacco shop.' There are quite a few kooban in any downtown area. The policemen there may not speak English but they will certainly help you find the place you are looking for. Of course, it will help a lot if you have the address of the place with you. The clerk at a tabako-ya also knows a lot about the places in his/her neighborhood. In fact, these are the two places where Japanese often go for directions.







2. Verbs frequently used in directions

'Go' and 'turn' are probably the two most frequently used verbs in giving directions. The Japanese words for these two verbs have different forms depending on their position in a sentence or how they occur with other words.

The following is a brief summary of some of these forms:

| ikimasu/magarimasu | used at the end of a sentence |
|--------------------|--|
| itte/magatte | used when you mention other actions (e.g., itte magarimasu go and turn) |

itta tokoro/magatta tokoro (tokoro means 'place'. The whole phrases mean 'the place you are to go'and 'the place to make a turn,' respectively.)

At this point it is not necessary for you to be able to produce these forms, but you should be able to guess the meaning of a sentence that contains either word if you can pick up such key words as 'straight,' 'right,' etc. It should be noted, however, that unlike English, in Japanese these key words occur before the verbs, as in the following examples:

Kono michi o massugu ikimasu.

Go straight (down) this street.

Tsugi no shingoo o migi ni magarimasu.

Turn to the right at the next traffic light.

3. Helpful things to know in getting directions

Streets in most Japanese cities do not run straight from north to south or from east to west. Furthermore, not all streets have names. Instead, Japanese normally use the area name and/or number like yon-choome when referring to the location of a building or a place.

Since Japanese does not have a word equivalent to English 'block,' in giving directions a Japanese will use words like kado 'corner,' shingoo 'traffic light,' koosaten 'intersection,' etc. For example, for 'Go one block and turn left...' a Japanese person would say Tsugi no kado o hidari ni magatte... 'Turn left at the next corner...' It is, therefore, very important for you to become familiar with these words and to learn how to use them.







USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. tooi 'far'

You can use the word tooi 'far', when you want to find out if the place to which you are going is far or near, as in the following example:

Tooi desu ka?

Is it far?

To understand the answer to this question, you will need to be able to pick up the following expression in addition to words like hai, ee, and iie.

Tooku arimasen.

(It's) not far.

2. qurai 'about'

The word gurai is comparable to English 'about' or 'approximately.' Note that in Japanese gurai follows the quantity expression while in English 'about' or 'approximately' precedes.

Examples:

a. 10-pun gurai desu. (It's) about 10 minutes.
b. 50 meetoru gurai desu. (It's) about 50 meters.

3. ...made 'as far as...'

You may sometimes hear a Japanese use the word made 'as far as' when s/he mentions a destination, as in the following example:

Soko made 10-pun gurai desu. It's about 10 minutes to there.

Again, note the difference in English and Japanese word order, as in the following:

eki made to/as far as the station
tsugi no shingoo made to/as far as the next traffic light

If we use the words ...kara 'from' and ...made 'as far as...,' we can indicate the distance between two places, as in the following examples:

Tokyo kara Osaka made from Tokyo to Osaka koko kara soko made from here to there

4. Other expressions often encountered in getting directions

- (a) Japanese people will often say something like 'If you go 50 meters, you will...'
 The Japanese expression for 'if you go' is ikuto or ikeba.
- (b) Similarly, they will often say something like 'You will see a department store on your right.' The Japanese expression for 'You will see ' is ...ga miemasu, which literally means ' is visible '

Example.

50 meetoru gurai ikuto, migi ni depaato ga miemasu.

If you go about 50 meters, you will see a department store on the right

(c) When indicating how long it takes to get to a place, the Japanese will often specify the means of transportation, e.g., 'on foot' The expression for 'on foot' in Japanese is aruite.

Example.

Soko made aruite 10-pun gurai desu.

It is/takes about 10 minutes to get there on foot

5. Two sets of numerals

In Lesson 8, we learned such expressions as futatsu-me (no shingoo), 'the second (traffic light),' and mittsu-me (no kado) 'the third (corner)'. The words futatsu-me and mittsu-me mean 'the second' and 'the third,' respectively, and futa- and mi- indicate the numbers 'two' and 'three'. These two words are native Japanese numerals. When simply counting numbers, however, the Japanese use another set of numerals which are of Chinese origin. The native Japanese numerals are used only for the numbers one to ten. Any numbers larger than ten are expressed in Chinese numerals. Below is a table that shows the difference between the two systems (Japanese = native Japanese numerals, Chinese = numerals of Chinese origin).

As indicated by the hyphen following the Japanese numerals above, the native Japanese numerals are always used with some other element. The exception is the number 10, too, which occurs without tsu at the end. Ask your instructor how these two sets of numerals are used in counting objects in Japanese.

6. Helpful things to know in getting directions

(a) You may experience a situation in which a Japanese person says to you 'I can't speak English,' even if you are talking to the person in Japanese! This remark is certainly a very discouraging one, especially to a person who has painstakingly studied Japanese before coming to Japan.

However, don't be too discouraged because even foreigners whose Japanese is quite fluent will have this experience occasionally. This is because ordinary Japanese assume that gaijin (外 人) 'foreigners' don't speak Japanese. Furthermore, most Japanese have little confidence in their ability to speak and understand English. Therefore, the first thing a Japanese person might do would be to 'proclaim' that s/he can't speak English (sometimes even before you start to talk).

In order not to embarrass such a person (or not to get embarrassed), be sure to use an attention-getter like Sumimasen and to wait for the answer. If you get a reply in Japanese, you can simply go ahead and ask for directions. If the person still does not answer, try someone else.

You may also experience a situation in which a Japanese person replies only in English, even if you are talking to the person in Japanese. In one sense, such a situation is convenient for you, for you can then begin communicating in English. However, you may feel discouraged or even insulted, because you may feel the person believes your Japanese is not good enough. Again, don't take these things too seriously, because it may be that the Japanese is simply trying to be courteous or friendly by speaking in English or that s/he wants to practice his/her English.

(b) The metric system is used in Japan and it may take some time to get the feeling of the amount expressed in meters, unless you are already familiar with the system. The following conversion tables are provided to give you a rough idea:



USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. How to express your desire to do something

When you want to express your desire to do something, you can use the following pattern:

V-tain desu.

I want to V

(Note V indicates a verb stem)

In order to use this expression, you have to know the correct verb form in this lesson, you will learn the verb form iki- 'go' as in the following example

Ikitain desu.

I want to go

To specify the place you want to go to, place the destination and the particle e in front of the above expression, as illustrated below

Ginza e ikitain desu.

I want to go to the Ginza

This expression will be especially useful when you want to find out where you can buy a ticket, how much the fare is, etc. In such cases, use an expression like the following

I want to go to the Ginza, where is the ticket window?

The Japanese expression for the above is

Ginza e ikitain desu ga, kippu uriba wa doko desu ka?

Note that the particle ga in the above sentence literally means 'but.' However, in this sentence it is only a way of smoothing the transition between the statement of desire 'I want to ' and what follows, and should not be taken literally.

a. When you want to find out the fare

When you want to find out a price, you can use the following expression

Ikura desu ka?

How much is it?

Thus, when you want to say 'I want to go to Toranomon, (but) how much is it?' (i.e., 'how much is the fare'), you can say

Toranomon e ikitain desu ga, ikura desu ka?

b. When you want to find out where you can buy a ticket

The following are some useful words to know if you want to find out where you can buy a ticket:

kippu ticket

kippu uriba ticket window (lit., ticket selling place)

(I) When you want to ask 'Can I buy a ticket here?' or 'Are tickets sold here?,' you can use the following expression:

Kippu wa koko desu ka? (lit., Are tickets here?)

Thus, the expression Toranomon e ikitain desu ga, kippu wa koko desu ka? means 'I want to go to Toranomon; can I buy a ticket here?'

If you are at the wrong window, the clerk at the window will tell you the right window number. S/he will say something like the following:

... ban no madoguchi desu. (It's) window #... (See Lesson 12 for usage of -ban.)

(II) When you want to find out where a ticket window is, you can use the following expression:

Kippu uriba wa doko desu ka?

As in (a) above, if you want to say 'I want to go to the Ginza; can you tell me where the ticket window is?,' you can say:

Ginza e ikitain desu ga, kippu uriba wa doko desu ka?

2. Some useful expressions for buying a ticket

The Japanese expressions used in buying a ticket at a ticket window are very simple. When you want to buy a ticket to the Ginza, for example, you simply say:

Ginza.

However, although not very likely, you may be asked by the clerk at the window how many tickets you want. In order to avoid being asked this kind of question, which you may find difficult to understand, it is a good idea to specify the number first. The number of tickets can be expressed in the following pattern:

numeral + mai

The word mai refers to thin flat objects. Words of this kind are sometimes called counters, for they are used when counting objects and persons. They indicate what kind of objects you are counting.

When you want to say 'One ticket to the Ginza,' for example, you can say:

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Ginza, ichi-mai.

Likewise, when you want to say 'Two tickets to Toranomon,' you can say:

Toranomon, ni-mai.

Note that in specifying the number of tickets, you simply use the appropriate number in Japanese and add mai, which stays the same, regardless of the number.

3. Tsurete itte agemashoo 'I'll take you there'

When directions you asked would be complicated and the place you are looking for is not far, a Japanese person will often take you there instead of giving you directions. In such a case, s/he would say:

Tsurete itte agemashoo. I'll take you there.

When a Japanese person doesn't know the place you are looking for, his/her typical reaction will be to say,

Saa, . . . or Soo desu ne . . . Well, . . .

He or she may then add:

Watakushi mo shirimasen. I don't know, either.

4. Kinds of tickets

a. Regular tickets

For most short distance trips, tickets can be bought from a ticket vending machine. In some cases, you can buy them only from a machine, not at a window. What you need to do to buy a ticket from a vending machine is:

- (I) Find out the fare from the fare chart, which usually takes the form of a map of train routes and is placed above the machines.
- (II) Put sufficient coins into the slot and push the button that has the correct price on it. The ticket (and change) will come out at the bottom of the machine.

b. kaisuu-ken (回数券) 'coupon tickets'

c. teeki-ken (定期寿) 'season pass' or 'commuter ticket'

The teeki-ken (定 期 券) is a season pass which entitles you to unlimited train rides between the designated stations for the designated period. You can buy a teeki-ken that is valid for one month, three months or six months at the ticket window of a station. With a teeki-ken, you can save nearly 50% of the regular price, depending on how often you use it and how long it is valid. The longer the designated period, the larger the discount rate is

5. How to buy the correct ticket

Since the station names on the fare chart are usually written only in Kanji, you need to be able to read the Kanji in order to buy the correct ticket unless you know the fare beforehand. You may wonder what you should do if you cannot read the station names and don't know the fare. The following are some suggestions for such occasions.

- a. Buy the lowest fare ticket from the machine, take the train and go to the unchin/ryookin-seesanjo (運賃/料金精算所) 'fare adjustment window' before you go through the gate at your destination. The clerk there will tell you how much the difference is. Pay the difference and get a receipt from the clerk. When you go through the gate give the receipt to the attendant. (You can't go through the automated gate with the receipt.)
- b Ask a Japanese person near the vending machine to buy the ticket for you The expressions that can be used for this purpose are

(your destination) e ikitain desu. I want go to (your destination)

Kippu o katte kudasaimasen ka? Would you please buy a ticket for me?

c If you only want to know the fare, you can ask somebody near you by saying

(your destination) e ikitain desu ga, ikura desu ka? I want to go to (your destination), but how much is it?

d Ask a Japanese friend to write the name of the station to which you are going in Kanji beforehand (If your friend knows the fare, you don't need to do this, of course) When you buy a ticket, match the Kanji station name you have with the one in the fare chart and find out the fare

6. Kaisatsuguchi (改札口) 'gate'

When entering or exiting the platform area, you must go through a kaisatsuguchi (改札口) In some stations in major cities, there are two types of kaisatsuguchi the automated gate and the one with an attendant. At such stations, if you have a regular ticket bought from the vending machine, you can go through the automated gate by simply inserting the ticket into the machine and removing it as you go through. Your ticket will not be returned when you go through the gate at your destination. If you have a kaisuu-ken (回数券) you must use the gate with an attendant, for your ticket must be punched or stamped by the attendant. (You give the ticket to the attendant at your destination.) With the teeki-ken (定期券) you should check whether you can use the automated gate or not, because some teeki-ken allow you to go through the automated gate and others don't. If you are not sure whether or not you can

go through the automated gate with the ticket you have, it is better to use the one with an attendant.

7. Public Transport

a. JR-sen (formerly Kokuden)

Japan Railway (JR) operates many electric train services in and through Tokyo. They are known as JR-sen trains, whose lines can be identified by the distinctive color of the coaches.

The Yamate-sen loop line circles the heart of Tokyo, one service going clockwise and the other counterclockwise. It stops at all sub-centers such as Shinjuku, Shinbashi, Shibuya, Ueno, Ikebukuro, Shinagawa, etc. Tokyo station is also one of the stops. The Yamate-sen coaches are green in color. It takes 62 minutes to make one complete round, which gives visitors an excellent cross-section view of Tokyo.

b. Subway

The Japanese call the subway chikatetsu. The ten subway lines which crisscross under Tokyo are the quickest and cheapest way of going from place to place. The coaches are clean, very well illuminated, and run at frequent intervals.

All lines start operating at 5 a.m. and most stop running just before midnight. The lines connect at various points with JR-sen trains.

Some of the entrances to the subway are on the sidewalk while others are on the sides of buildings. Big stations have several entrances (exits) which could be more than 100 meters apart. Therefore, ask which exit you should take to reach your destination. At every platform, the name of the station is spelled out in English.

Most stations have automatic ticket vendors. It is recommended that, whatever the destination, you buy the minimum... en ticket. You can pay the difference when you get off. Tickets are punched as you go through the gate and must be turned in at the end of the ride, so hang on to them.

c. Bus

The bus is the best way for getting to points between the subway and a JR-sen station. It gets you closest to where you want to go because the distances between stops are short. However, buses are very difficult to use unless you know the language or are familiar with the routes. The tremendous number of routes and the obscure identification of the stops can be most confusing. Ride buses only if you are able to obtain clear, specific, and accurate directions beforehand.



USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. How to find out the right track/platform

Since there are usually several tracks in a station (at larger stations, there are more than 10 tracks), you need to know from which platform or track your train leaves. Each track has its own number (a platform usually has two tracks), and this is expressed in the following way

numeral + bansen

Thus, track number 1, for example, can be expressed as ichi-bansen. One way to find out if your train leaves from track #1 is to ask a question like the following

(your destination) e ikitain desu ga, ichi-bansen desu ka? I want to go to (your destination), is it track #1?

(i e , Does my train leave from track #1?)

Another way to find out the right track is to ask something like 'I want to go to (your destination), from which track does my train leave?'

The Japanese expression for 'what track' is nan-bansen Thus, you can use the following expression

(destination) e ikitain desu ga, nan-bansen desu ka? I want to go to (destination) What track is it?

The Japanese word for 'platform' is hoomu, which was originally borrowed from the second syllable of the English word. If you want to make sure that you are on the right platform, you can use the following expression.

Yokohama e ikitain desu ga, kono hoomu desu ka? I want to go to Yokohama Is it this platform?

Note Kono in kono hoomu means 'this' but the word must always occur with other word(s) after it, as in kono chikaku 'this vicinity' (Lesson 3). On the other hand, the word kore, which also means 'this,' occurs independently, as in Kore wa nan desu ka? 'What is this?' (Lesson 1)

2. (Yokohama)-iki '(train) bound for (Yokohama)'

When you refer to a train bound for a certain station--Yokohama, for example, you can use the following expression

Yokohama-iki (trains) bound for Yokohama

You can use this expression when you want to find out if a train is bound for the place you have in mind or when you want to find out the track from which the train bound for a certain place leaves, as in the following examples.

- a. Kono densha wa Yokohama-iki desu ka?

 Is this train bound for Yokohama?
- b. Yokohama-iki wa nan-bansen desu ka? What track is the Yokohama train?

3. Ikimasu 'goes' and tomarimasu 'stops'

When you want to find out if a train goes to a certain place or if it stops at a certain station, you might ask in English (a) 'Does this train go to . . .?' and (b) 'Does this train stop at . . .?,' respectively. The Japanese expressions for these English questions follow:

- a. Kono densha wa . . . e ikimasu ka?

 Does this train go to . . . ?
- b. Kono densha wa . . . ni tomarimasu ka?

 Does this train stop at . . . ?

It should be noted that the particle ni 'at' is used after the name of the station at which the train stops.

The following are typical answers to the above two questions:

Yes-answers Hai/Ee, ikimasu/tomarimasu.
 No-answers lie, ikimasen/tomarimasen.

4. The particle to 'and'

The word to is comparable to English 'and' but the usage is a little different from the English equivalent, as illustrated below:

A to B
A to B to C
A, B, and C

Note that in English you need 'and' only before the last item you enumerate while in Japanese, to is necessary after each item except the last. The following example will illustrate this difference:

Kono densha wa Nagoya to Kyoto to Osaka ni tomarimasu.

This train stops at Nagoya, Kyoto, and Osaka.

Also, note that English 'and' can connect verbs as well as nouns, but Japanese to can connect nouns only.

5. Densha (電車) 'trains'

In the nation-wide transportation services, JR (Japanese Railways) plays the central role, and the Shinkansen (新幹線), often referred to as the 'bullet train', is an important part of JR's operation.

The Shinkansen covers the approximately 730 miles between Tokyo (東京) and Hakata (博多) in Kyushyu (九川) and connects the major cities of Japan. The Shinkansen trains run at 5 to 10 - minute intervals, the normal travelling speed of the fastest train, the 'Hikari,' being about 200 km per hour.

1. Types of trains

The Shinkansen has the following classification of trains:

Hikari (ひかり): stops at major stations Kodama (こたま): stops at all stations

For long distance trips other than on the Shinkansen, you will find the following three major categories of JR trains:

tokkyuu (特色) super express or limited express kyuukoo (色行) express train stopping at major stations futsuu (普通) local trains stopping at all stations

Note: Futsuu (普通) is also called kakueki (各駅), an abbreviation of kakueki teesha (各駅停車), that stops at every station. Hikari, Kodama, tokkyuu and kyuukoo require a supplementary fare. However, the fare is the same all year round (i.e., there is no 'in-season' or 'off-season' fare).

JR-sen has the following major train categories:

kaisoku (快速) express train kakueki-teesha (各駅停車) local train

Note: Kaisoku does not require a supplementary fare.

2. Types of cars and seats

There are two types of cars and seats on JR trains:

a. cars (i) futsuu-sha (普通車) economy class (car) (ii) guriin-sha (クリーン車) fırst class (car)

Note: A supplementary fare is required for first class. Griin means green. Each first class car has a square green symbol displayed next to its doors.

b. seats (i) jiyuu-seki (自由席) unreserved seats

Note: jiyuu (自由) freedom, free seki (席) seat

(II) shitee-seki (指定席)

reserved seats

Note A supplementary fare is required for reserved seats.

3. nobori $(\pm b)$ and kudari (b)

up-train and down-train

Trains bound for the originating station of the line are called **nobor** ($\pm \vartheta$) 'up-train,' and those bound for the other end of the line are called **kudar** ($\top \nabla - \vartheta$) 'down-train'. For example, on the Shinkansen, trains bound for Tokyo are **nobor** and those for Kyoto, Osaka, etc. are **kudar**.

6. Doozo 'Please (have a seat)' (when you want to offer your seat)

Although 'ladies first' is not generally practiced in Japan, it is a courtesy to offer your seat to the elderly or to a mother with a small child. When you want to offer your seat, you can say Doozo 'Please'

Sometimes you may hear a child asking its mother for a seat. Japanese people who happen to be sitting in front of them usually feel obliged to offer a seat. If you feel the same way, go ahead and offer your seat. If you don't, you may choose to ignore it since, as a foreigner, people will generally assume you did not understand what the child said

If you take a JR train, it will probably have a shirubaa shiito (lit, 'silver seat') for senior citizens and the handicapped. Avoid sitting in this seat unless you consider yourself elderly or handicapped.

As a rule, sit down whenever you find a seat Especially in a crowded train or bus, you will be much safer and more comfortable if you are seated.

7. More informations on trains

For a Ride on the Bullet Train

The shortest trip that you can take to get the feel of the 'bullet train,' reputedly the most comfortable and fastest in the world, is the 43-minute ride to Odawara—So, if you have a bit more than two hours to spare and are willing to invest—5,140 yen (2,570 yen one way) you can experience a ride on the bullet train without having to go all the way to Kyoto or Osaka. The bullet train is known as the Shinkansen. There are two Shinkansen trains—the Hikari and the Kodama. For the short ride, you take the Kodama—Between Tokyo and Odawara, it stops only at Shin-Yokohama, up to which it runs at a leisurely pace. From there to Odawara, it goes faster, although not quite at maximum speed.

Stations

The Hikari is the faster train because it makes fewer stops. The longest Hikari distance is the 1,176.5 kilometers from Tokyo to Hakata in Kyushu. The fastest Hikari service between these points takes 6 hours and 56 minutes, with six stops in between--Nagoya, Kyoto, Shin Osaka, Okayama, Hiroshima and Kokura. The slowest service takes 7 hours 48 minutes with additional stops beyond Okayama. The Hikari covers the distance between Tokyo and Kyoto (513.6 kilometers) in 2 hours and 53 minutes, Tokyo-Shin Osaka in 3 hours 10 minutes, and Tokyo-Hiroshima (fastest service) in 5 hours 8 minutes.

The Kodama takes one hour longer to get to Kyoto. There are no Kodama trains which go through from Tokyo to Hakata. The Kodama service is essentially Tokyo to Shin Osaka and Shin Osaka to Hakata.

Frequency

The bullet train service is very frequent. Starting at 6 a.m., about four Hikari trains and three or four Kodama trains leave Tokyo every hour. The day's last Hikari for Hakata leaves Tokyo at 5 p.m., arriving at 11:56 p.m. The last Hikari for Shin Osaka (one stop beyond Kyoto) leaves at 8:24 p.m. The last Kodama for Shin Osaka leaves at 7:28 p.m. Both the Hikari and Kodama have reserved seats which are sold seven days in advance at the Green Window installed at major JR stations. At Tokyo station they are sold at the south end of the Yaesu side.

Other Trains

More leisurely rail trips from Tokyo to Osaka and points beyond can be taken on the Tokaido limited express (tokkyuu) trains. Since the destination of most of the Tokaido limited express trains is Kyushu, they are not scheduled for convenient arrival times in Osaka. For going to Hiroshima, the limited express is best.

Limited expresses leave from **Tokyo** station between 4:30 a.m. and 7:25 p.m. at irregular intervals. The travel time to **Osaka** is about 7 hours 30 minutes, but some limited expresses going west do not stop at **Osaka**. The travel time to **Hiroshima** is about 12 hours; to **Hakata** in **Kyushu**, about 16 hours 30 minutes; and to **Nagasaki**, about 19 hours 30 minutes.

Sleepers

Sleepers are available at extra charge on the limited expresses. There are two types of sleepers, 'A' and 'B.' The A sleepers are either one-bed compartments or just two berths, the upper and the lower.

The B sleepers are either the two-berth type or three berths--the upper, middle, and lower. The berths in the A sleepers are fairly roomy. The upper berth is 30 inches wide and 74 inches long and the lower berth is 37 by 74 inches. The berths of the B sleepers are just as long but only 20.5 inches wide. The cost of the berth is in addition to the regular limited express fares.

Reserved seat, express, limited express, and sleeper tickets must be obtained at the Green Window (Midori no madoguchi).





USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. tsugi 'next'

In Lesson 8, you learned the word tsugi 'next' as in tsugi no shingoo 'the next traffic light.' The word can also be used when you want to make sure that the next stop or station is the one you have in mind. What do you think you should say when you want to ask something like 'Is the next station Ginza?' If you thought of the following sentence, you already know a lot about the word tsugi:

Tsugi no eki wa Ginza desu ka?

If you are on a train and want to ask the same question, you can simply say the following:

Tsugi wa Ginza desu ka?

The reason no eki is dropped in the above sentence is that it is clear to the listener from the context that tsugi refers to eki. In fact, the above sentence is the one most Japanese people would use in this situation since it is shorter and easier to use.

It may turn out that the answer to the above question is something like 'the one after next.' In such a case, the Japanese say:

Tsuqi no tsuqi desu.

(It's) the one after next.

2. Ordinal numbers

In Lesson 8, you also learned expressions like the following:

futatsu-me no shingoo mittsu-me no kado the second traffic light

the third corner

Ordinal expressions like futatsu-me 'the second' and mittsu-me 'the third' can also be used when you talk about the order of the stations on a train line. Look at the following:

Ginza wa futatsu-me (no eki) desu. Ginza is the second station.

Ueno wa mittsu-me (no eki) desu. Ueno is the third station.

As in Tsugi wa Ginza desu ka?, it is not necessary to say no eki after the ordinal numbers, i.e., futatsu-me and mittsu-me, since the context clarifies what you are talking about.

3. Questions using ordinal numbers

In some situations, you may have to find out how many stations there are between the station at which you boarded the train and your destination, or how many stations there are before your destination. In such situations, you can use the following expression:

(station name) wa ikutsu-me desu ka?

English does not have a comparable expression for ikutsu-me, although sometimes you may see something like 'the how-many-eth.' Ikutsu means 'how many' and, as we have seen, -me indicates the preceding word is an ordinal number. Thus, the above sentence can be translated as:

How many more stations before (station name)(from here)?

The answer to the above question will include an ordinal expression like mittsu-me, yottsu-me, etc. The following example will show how this question can be answered:

- A: Yokohama wa ikutsu-me desu ka?
- B: Yottsu-me desu yo.

When you have already passed your destination, the Japanese will say something like this:

(your destination) wa moo sugimashita yo.

We've already passed (your destination).

When the person doesn't know the answer him/herself, s/he will say something like the following:

Saa, wata(ku)shi mo shirimasen. I don't know, either.

4. Useful expressions for getting off a train or bus

In some cases when you are on a bus or train, you may want to ask a Japanese person to let you know when you arrive at your destination. In such cases, you may find the following expression useful:

(your destination) ni tsuitara oshiete kudasaimasen ka?

Won't you please tell me when we've arrived at (destination)?

If you are a commuter it is a good idea to become familiar with the Kanji for the name of the stop right before your destination, so that you know when to get ready to get off.

Since commuter trains and buses are incredibly crowded at rush hours, it may happen that because of the crowd you can't get off at your stop. To avoid this, you need to say something in order to get people out of your way. In such cases, you can use the following expression:

Orimasu!

Let me out!(lit., I'm getting off.)

5. basu(バス) 'bus'

Japanese buses are equipped with a tape of the pre-recorded names of their stops which is set to announce, at the appropriate time, the name of the next stop.

In most cases, you pay as you enter a bus. It is advisable that you have the exact change, although there is a money exchange machine which exchanges a hundred yen coin for ten yen coins (you can't use a bill). The fares are usually in units of 100 yen and 10 yen. If you don't know the fare, you can ask the driver by saying:

(your destination) made ikura desu ka?

Kaisuu-ken (回 数 券) 'coupon tickets' and teeki-ken (定 期 券) 'season pass' are also available, but these can't be bought on a bus. You have to go to a ticket window at the main bus terminal. There is no free ticket transfer system.







(Your destination) e ikitain desu ga, deguchi wa doko desu ka? I want to go to (your destination) Which exit should I use?

2. Kaidan (階段) 'stairway'

In giving directions to your exit, Japanese may say something like 'Go down/up the stairs . . .' The Japanese word for 'stairway' is kaidan (階段).

The Japanese language has specific verbs for 'go up (the stairs)' and 'go down (the stairs)'. Look at the following:

a. Kaidan o noborimasu/agarimasu. Go up the stairs

b. Kaidan o orimasu. Go down the stairs

As mentioned in Lesson 9, Japanese verbs have different forms depending on how they are used in a sentence. Therefore you may hear different forms than **noborimasu** and **orimasu**. However, if you can pick up the key word **kaidan** and locate the staircase, then you can pretty well guess whether to go up or down. If there are two **kaidan** at a place where you have a choice of going up or going down, then ask directions there again.

3. norikae (乗り換え) 'transfer'

In some cases, you may have to change trains or buses or change from a train to a bus or vice versa. The Japanese word for 'a transfer (point)' is norikae (乗り換え) and 'to transfer' is norikaemasu. Look at the following:

> Tokyo-iki ni norikaemasu transfer to a Tokyo-bound train/bus

Yokohama de norikaemasu transfer in Yokohama

Yokohama de Tokyo-iki ni transfer to a Tokyo-bound train/bus norikaemasu in Yokohama

Note: When you change the means of transportation, Japanese will specify that change as in the following:

> Yokohama de Tokyo-iki no transfer to a Tokyo-bound bus in basu ni norikaemasu Yokohama

Again, Japanese speakers may use different forms than norikaemasu, depending on what words surround it. However, if you can pick up norikae, which is common to all the forms, it will not be too difficult to get the meaning correctly.

Note the use of the particle de in the following sentence from Situation 3:

Soko de Marunouchi-sen ni norikaete kudasai.

An expression of location like soko 'there' followed by the particle de indicates the place where something has happened or will happen. This de is often equivalent to English 'at' or 'in', though the exact translation will depend, as here, on the context. You will see this particle again in later lessons.



If, however, your destination is relatively unknown, e.g., your apartment, you should first give the area name in which your apartment is located. Let us assume that your apartment is located in Aoyama 4-chome. You first say Aoyama 4-chome made onegai shimasu. The driver will ask you the exact location when you get to the area, saying something like the following:

Okyaku-san, Aoyama 4-chome desu yo.

Customer, we are at Aoyama 4-chome

Doko de tomemasu (tomemashoo) ka? OR Doko desu ka?, etc.

Where shall I stop? Where do you want me to stop?, etc

Of course, your driver may not say exactly what is given above. What is important is that when you go to a place whose location is not likely to be familiar to the driver, you give the area name first and then give the directions as you approach the place you want to go. To do this, you must, of course, be familiar with the neighborhood of your destination.

However, when the name you have given covers a large area, the driver may ask where in that area you want to go. Again, the driver may use different expressions, which may include a phrase like (area name) no doko 'where in (area name),' as in the following.

Example:

You: Ginza made onegai shimasu.

Driver: Ginza no doko desu ka?

OR

Ginza no doko ni ikitain desu ka? Where in the Ginza do you want to go? When you give directions to the driver, it is often helpful to mention a landmark near your destination, as the following example illustrates

You: Ginza made onegai shimasu.

Driver: Ginza no doko desu ka?

You: Mitsukoshi no tonari desu.

Next to the Mitsukoshi department store

If you are not confident of pronouncing the name of the destination correctly, it is a good idea to have a Japanese friend write the name in Kanji on a piece of paper so that you can take it along to show the driver. When you want to do this, you can simply say the following

Koko made onegai shimasu. To this place, please

However, this strategy may not always be successful if your destination isn't well known or if you don't know a landmark near your destination to tell the driver. Even though he/she will certainly be able to get to the area of your destination, the driver may still not be able to locate the place. This is because it is very difficult to find out a location by simply reading the address, for not every street has a name nor every house a number.

2. How to stop the cab at your destination

When you want to stop the cab at your destination, you can use the following expression

Koko de tomete kudasai. Please stop here

Note the particle de (<) after the word koko 'here' in the sentence above. As we mentioned in Lesson 14, an expression of location like koko followed by de indicates the place where something has happened or will happen. Instead of koko in the sentence above you could also use various other place expressions you have learned to tell the cab driver where to stop. For example

Tsugi no shingoo de tomete kudasai.

Please stop at the next traffic light

Mittsu-me no koosaten de tomete kudasai.

Please stop at the third intersection

3. How to pay the fare

Since every taxi has a fare meter in the front and you don't need to tip, you can simply look at the meter and pay the fare before you get out. If you want to make sure of the fare, you can, of course, ask the following question

Ikura desu ka? How much is it?

When you get out, after having paid the fare, you can say

Doomo (arigatoo). Thank you

However, don't be surprised if the driver doesn't respond. She may not be very sociable. Some drivers may not say anything until you give them the destination when you get in the cab, or even after you give it to them.

It would be a good idea for you to have 500-yen or 1,000-yen bills available when the destination is not very far, as it may happen that the driver is not able to change a large bill.

4. ookii X 'large/big **X**'

USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

How to locate the merchandise you want to see or buy in a department store

In all major department stores, there are directories written both in English and Japanese. They are usually placed near the entrance, stairways, and elevators. Therefore, you will probably have little problem finding the floor you want. You can ask a person at the information desk (near ground floor entrances), the elevator operator, or the 'escalator girl.' (Ask your instructor about the 'elevator girl' and the 'escalator girl.') You can use the following expressions, which you learned in Lesson 6, to ask the location of merchandise.

If you want to locate the watch counter, for example, you can say the following:

| Tokee wa doko desu ka? | Where are the watches? |



USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. When you want to say 'Please show me. . . '

As we learned in earlier lessons, when you want to ask somebody to do something for you, you can use the following pattern

V (TE-form)kudasaı.

'Please V (for me),'

where V indicates a verb form

So far we have learned the following expressions, which include the above pattern

Yukkuri itte kudasai. (Lesson 2)

Please say (it) slowly

Moo ichi-do itte kudasai. (Lesson 2)

Please say (it) again

Koko ni kaite kudasai. (Lesson 4)

Please write (it) here

Ueno ni tsuitara oshiete kudasai. (Lesson 13)

Please tell me when we

get to Ueno

Takushii o yonde kudasai. (Lesson 15) Please call a taxı (for me)

Since in this pattern the verb ends with -te (or -de), this form is often referred to as the Te-form of the verb. In this lesson, we learn the verb misete 'show'. You can use this word when you want to ask a salesclerk to show you some merchandise, as in the following example.

(merchandise) o misete kudasai.

Please show me (merchandise)

Note Although, grammatically speaking, the particle o is necessary after the name of the merchandise, it is often dropped in actual conversation. Hence

Sore (o) misete kudasai.

Please show me that

2. One way to indicate your preference: how to say 'one that is larger'

In Lesson 15 we learned the word **ook**ii 'large,' 'big,' which can be used just like its English equivalent, as in the following example

ookii suupaa

large supermarket

In this lesson we learn similar words like chiisai 'small' and yasui cheap, inexpensive '

chiisai seetaa vasui kamera

small sweater inexpensive camera

When you mention the size, price, etc. of merchandise you have been talking about, it is not always necessary to specify the merchandise. In English, for example, you would normally say 'small ones' rather than 'small sweaters' when you have been talking about sweaters. Japanese people do the same thing, and the particle no can be used for this purpose. Look at the following examples.

chiisai seetaasmall sweater(s)chiisai nosmall one(s)

When shopping, you may often find yourself asking a salesclerk to show you larger/smaller items than the ones you are examining. For example, you may want to say something like 'Please show me smaller ones' or 'Do you carry smaller ones?' In English, you add <u>-er</u> to the word small, with <u>a little</u> in front of it. In Japanese, you do not add anything to chiisai but instead you place moo sukoshi 'a little more' in front of the word, as the following examples illustrate:

moo sukoshi chiisai seetaa a little smaller sweater(s)

(lit., sweaters which are a little smaller)

moo sukoshi chiisai no a little smaller one(s)

(lit., ones which are a little smaller)

Thus, if you want to ask a salesclerk if the store carries smaller ones than the one you are examining, you can say:

Moo sukoshi chiisai no wa arimasu ka?

Do you carry/have smaller ones? (cf. Lesson 4)

Likewise, when you want to ask the clerk to show you less expensive ones, you can say:

Moo sukoshi yasui no o misete kudasai.

Please show me ones that are a little cheaper

3. Another way to indicate your preference: how to say 'one in a different size/color/style'

The word chigau 'different' can be used just like its English equivalent, as the following example shows:

chigau iro different color(s)

When you want to say 'a sweater in a different size/color/style,' you can use the following pattern.

| chigau saizu | no seetaa | sweater in different size(s) |
|--------------|-----------|------------------------------|

Thus, when you want to say something like 'Do you carry them in different sizes/colors/styles?' or 'Please show me some in different sizes/colors/styles,' you can use the following expressions

- a. Chigau saizu/iro/katachi no wa arimasu ka?

 Do you carry them in different sizes/colors/styles?
- b. Chigau saizu/iro/katachi no o misete kudasai. Please show me this/these in different sizes/colors/styles
- **4. kono..., sono..., ano...** 'this..., that..., that...over there'

In some cases, you may have to specify which of the items (in a showcase, for example) you want to have a look at. In English, you could say something like 'please show me that sweater.'

The English words this and that do not change form regardless of the position of the word in the sentence. In Japanese, however, the equivalent words do change forms, depending on whether or not they occur before nouns. The following examples will show this difference:

| Kore wa kamera desu. | This is a camera |
|----------------------|------------------|
| kono kamera | this camera |

As indicated above, the word kono 'this' occurs only before a noun. Putting it differently, when you want to say 'this camera, sweater, etc.' in Japanese, you must use kono and cannot use kore. You have already seen this word in kono chikaku 'this vicinity' (Lesson 5) and kono michi 'this street' (Lesson 10). In this lesson, we will learn sono. . . 'that. ' and ano. . . 'that over there'. The meanings of these words are exactly the same as those of the corresponding words sore and are

The following is a summary of the words of this type we have learned so far:

5. Some expressions that indicate the location of merchandise

When you ask a salesclerk to show you merchandise, you may have to indicate the position of the merchandise, for example, 'the one above it,' 'the one to the right of it' or the like. This can be expressed in Japanese quite easily if we use words like kono 'this,' sono 'that', ano 'that, over there,' particle no 'the one,' migi 'right,' hidari 'left,' ue 'on top,' and shita 'below' Look at the following

migi no kamera the camera on the right migi no the one on the right

sono migi no kamera the camera to the right of it

OR

that camera on the right

sono migi no that one to the right of it

OR

that one on the right

Let us assume a situation like the following

A salesclerk points to some merchandise and you want to see the one to the right/left of it or above/below it

Each position can be shown as follows

X indicates the item the clerk has pointed to

a. When you want to see the item represented by [1] in the illustration

Sono ue (no) desu. (It's) the one above it

OR

Sono ue no o misete kudasai. Please show me the one above it

b. When you want to see the item represented by [4]

Sono shita (no) desu. (It's) the one below

OR

Sono shita no o misete kudsai. Please show me the one below it

c. When you want to see the item represented by [3]

Sono migi (no) desu. (It's) the one to the right of it

OR

Sono migi no o misete kudasai. Please show me the one on the

right

d. When you want to see the item represented by [2]:

Sono hidari (no) desu. (It's) the one on the left of it.

OR

Sono hidari no o misete kudasai. Please show me the one on the left.

6. A polite expression used by salesclerks

In Lesson 5 the in-group/out-group distinction was introduced. Consistent with this concept, you can expect salesclerks to use polite expressions to customers (out-group members). The following are some of the expressions frequently used by salesclerks:

a. Irasshaimase.

May I help you? (lit., Welcome!)

You may hear the less formal form Irasshai at your neighborhood store.

b. Okyakusama no o osagashi de irasshaimasu ka?

Are you looking for something for yourself?

c. ...de gozaimasu = desu

This is the formal and more polite form of desu 'is/am/are.'

d. Ainiku de gozaimasu ga...

Unfortunately...

This expression is often used when the store doesn't carry the item you are looking for.

There are many more formal expressions used by clerks. Some of them are routine ones and you can predict when they will occur (like irasshaimase). Others are not so predictable. What is important is not that you use them correctly but that you attempt to figure out what the clerk is talking about from the context. You have already learned some helpful expressions that can be used when you have problems comprehending what a Japanese person is saying (e.g., those used to ask someone to repeat, slow down, etc.), so don't be embarrassed even if you don't understand. Furthermore, since you are the customer, the clerk will make an effort to make you understand what s/he is saying or to understand what you are saying.



USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. Kore o kudasai 'I'll take this' or 'Please give me this'

As we learned in Lesson 15, the word kudasai can be used, with a verb te-form before it, when you make a request. For example, when you want to see some merchandise, you can say to the clerk Kore o misete kudasai 'Please show me this one.' The word kudasai can also be used independently, as the following example illustrates:

Kore o kudasai.

(Please) give me this.

As the English equivalent indicates, the word kudasai by itself means '(Please) give me.' Thus, we can use it when we want to say something like 'I'll take this' in a store. Please note that the word that refers to the thing you want, followed by the particle o, is placed before kudasai. However, here again, as in onegai shimasu, the particle o can be omitted in conversation.

When you want to say 'I'll take three of these' or 'Please give me three of these,' you simply add the number (and a counter) in front of kudasai, as in the following example:

Kore o mittsu kudasai.

Please give me three of these.

Please note that a native Japanese numeral is used in the above example. As explained in Lesson 10, Japanese uses different counters for different objects. -tsu is the general-purpose counter always used with the native Japanese numerals from one to nine. When you are not sure of the appropriate counter for the thing you want, use the native Japanese numeral and -tsu. Although in some cases this may sound odd to a Japanese person, it is comprehensible.

Likewise, when you want to say 'I'll take 100 grams of that,' you can say:


Sore o hyaku-guramu kudasai.


Please give me 100 grams of that.

2. How to say '500 yen per 100 grams'

At grocery stores, fish stores, etc., the price tags are often written in the following ways:







Note: The tags above are read as 100 guramu 500 yen

When you refer to beef that is 300 yen per 100 grams, for example, you can say:

100 guramu 300-en no (gyuu)niku

This expression can be generalized into the following pattern

Unit (100 g, 1 kg, etc.) price no merchandise

e.g. 100 guramu 500-en no gyuuniku 100 g of the beef that is 500 yen

1 kiro 300-en no ringo 1 kg of the apples that are 300 yen

However, as we discussed in Lesson 17, when you have been talking about a particular item or when you choose one from among several, it is not necessary to say its name again You can simply say.

100 guramu 500-en no

the one that is 500 yen for 100 g

When you want to order 200 g of the merchandise that is 500 yen for 100 grams, for example, you can use the following expression

100 guramu 500-en no o 200 guramu kudasai.

Please give me 200 g of the one that is 500 yen for 100 g

You may have noticed that this expression is merely an expansion of what we discussed above. Compare the following

Kore o 200 guramu kudasai. Please give me 200 g of this

100 guramu 500-en no o 200 Please give me 200 g of the one that guramu kudasai is 500 yen for 100 g

3. When you decide not to buy anything and you want to leave the store

When you find out that the store doesn't carry the item you want and you want to leave, you can use the following expressions

Jaa, kekkoo desu. (lit., 'Well, that's all right ')

The word **kekkoo** means 'fine' or 'all right.' The above expression means something like 'If you don't have the merchandise I want, then I'll go without (i.e., I won't buy).'

When you leave the store, you may want to express your gratitude to the clerk for showing you the merchandise by saying **Doomo** (arigatoo), etc.

When you can't find what you want and you want to leave the store, you may say something like 'I'll come again.' This can be expressed as follows:

Jaa, mata kimasu. Well, I'll come again

4. Bargaining

Ordinarily, you don't bargain in Japan (especially at department stores). However, at small shops such as antique shops, for example, there are cases in which people do bargain. However, you should try to bargain only after observing other customers to find out whether it is acceptable to bargain at the shop you are in, for bargaining can be offensive to the clerk or shopkeeper.

When you want to bargain, you can use the following expression:

Moo sukoshi yasuku narimasen ka?

'Can't you make it cheaper?' (lit., Won't it become a little cheaper?)

USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. How to ask the total price you pay

In English, when you have bought several items or you want to make sure of the price you must pay, you might ask 'How much is that in all?' The Japanese expression for this is:

Zenbu de ikura desu ka?

How much is it altogether?

2. Otsuri 'change'

In most shops, you don't have to take the merchandise to the cashier. The clerk will take care of it (bookstores are an exception). Give the merchandise and the money to the clerk. He or she will wrap it and bring it back to you with your change, if there is any.

It often happens, especially in a department store, that the clerk states the amount of money s/he has received from you at the time you pay. In such cases, s/he will say:

(amount you gave)-en oazukari itashimasu. I have received (amount you gave) yen.

The way the clerk gives you change is different in Japan from the normal American practice. When the clerk hands you your change, s/he may say the following:

X-en no otsuri de gozaimasu. Here's your change of X-yen.

(Note: Instead of otsuri, okaeshi [which literally means 'return'] may also be used.)

In some cases, the clerk may give you your change without stating the amount.

Although it should not happen very frequently, you may occasionally be shortchanged. When this happens, you should make it clear how much you handed to the clerk. You can use the following expression for this purpose:

Ima X-en watashimashita ga. . . I gave you X yen.

Then the clerk will check the change and give you the correct amount.

3. When you leave the store

When you leave the store, the clerk will probably say one of the following:

Arigatoo gozaimashita. Maido doomo. Thank you very much.

Thank you. (maido literally means 'every time' and is often used at neighborhood

stores)

Maido arigatoo gozaimasu. Mata doozo.

Thank you very much. Please come again.

It is not necessary to say anything in reply to the above but you may say Sayonara, if you wish.

4. A different way of giving change

When you make a small purchase in a Japanese shop and pay for it with a large bill, you might get the impression that at least in one respect the Japanese are not very considerate. The clerk will not hand you the change in the American way, counting it out as s/he hands it to you. Instead, s/he will hand you all the different denominations in a lump, just saying Arigatoo gozaimasu 'thank you'.

This method of giving change might appear inconsiderate to those accustomed to the western way. It might even arouse doubts as to whether one has been chortchanged. But if you carefully observe the Japanese customers, you will note that most of them hardly appear to check the amount before putting it away.

It may be that some customers simply trust the clerks or at least don't want to give the impression that they mistrust them. It might also be that some feel that it's unseemly to count money in public. In most cases, however, it's just that the Japanese are good and fast at arithmetic.

The Japanese who pays for a 1,150 yen purchase with a 10,000 yen note has already calculated in his/her head the amount of change s/he should receive. When the change is given, one swift glance and some quick mental arithmetic tells the customer whether it is the correct amount.

Conversely, a Japanese person traveling in the United States for the first time is usually bewildered when the clerk gives change in the American way. S/he would think that it is a lot of unnecessary trouble and excessive consideration for the customer.

5. Counters for fruits and vegetables

In English, we can ordinarily put a number directly before the word for a fruit or vegetable, for example, 'one pear, two cabbages, three cucumbers', etc. However, even in English, there are some exceptions such as 'one head of lettuce' or 'two bunches of spinach', where a counter is needed.

In Japanese, all words for fruits and vegetables (as well as many other nouns) require a counter between the number and the word for the fruit or vegetable. Some commonly used counters include:

yama (for piles of apples, oranges, carrots, cucumbers, tomatoes, etc.)
wa (for bunches of spinach or carrots, etc.)
ko (for heads of lettuce or cabbage, individual apples, oranges, etc.)

hon (for individual cucumbers, carrots, etc.)





USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. Weather terminology and greetings

After exchanging greetings like Ohayoo gozaimasu 'Good morning' or Konnichiwa 'Good afternoon,' Japanese often mention something about the weather. The weather expressions used in such situations should be taken as a kind of greeting just as in English. However, you may find that the Japanese use these expressions more frequently than Americans. The following are some weather words frequently used in greetings:

atsui hot samui cold

ii (o)tenki good weather ([o]tenki = weather)

iya na (o)tenki awful weather

All these words can be used in the following pattern:

Kyoo wa (atsui) desu. Today is (hot).

When Japanese weather expressions are used as greetings, they typically take the form of a request for confirmation, as in English:

English: It's hot, isn't it? Japanese: **Atsui desu ne**.

Again, as in English, Japanese responses to this kind of greeting are usually in the affirmative (i.e., you say that you agree).

The following are some typical Japanese responses:

a. Simple repetition

A: Atsui desu ne.B: Atsui desu ne.

b. Soo desu ne. That is so, isn't it?

A: Samui desu ne. It's cold, isn't it?

B: Soo desu ne. Yes, isn't it?

c. Hontoo desu ne. That's true, isn't it?

A: li otenki desu ne. It's a fine day, isn't it?

B: Hontoo desu ne. It certainly is.

2. Where are you going?

In Lesson 1, you learned that 'How are you?' functions in English primarily as a greeting and that the expression is not usually used to make an inquiry about the listener's health. The comparable Japanese expression, Ogenki desu ka?, is used both as a greeting and as an inquiry about health.

In this lesson, you will learn another such formula When you go out, your neighbor may say something like the following

(Ima) odekake desu ka? Are you going out (now)?

Dokoka e odekake desu ka? Are you going somewhere?

If a person is not familiar with the way these expression are used, it might seem that the Japanese are very nosy. However, these are routine expressions used as part of a greeting and should not be taken literally. Just like English 'How are you?', they are used to acknowledge a human relationship. Since this is the case, you don't really have to give exact answers to the 'inquiry.' A typical answer is Ee, chotto (soko made) 'Yes, just over there'

Similarly, when you come home, your neighbor may say

(Ima) okaeri desu ka?

Are (you) coming home (now)?

You can simply answer Ee to this greeting

3. How to close an encounter

Often it is more difficult to close a conversation than to open one. This is especially true when speaking a foreign language. In your daily encounters with your Japanese neighbors, it may sometimes happen that greetings become longer than you really want them to be. Look at the following

Nihonjin: Jonson-san, ohayoo gozaimasu.

Jonson: Ohayoo gozaimasu.
Nihoniin: Ima odekake desu ka?

Jonson: Ee.

Nihonjin: Kyoo wa ii otenki desu ne.

Jonson: Soo desu ne. Ja, mata.

Unless Jonson-san shows some sign that he wants to go, the friendly Japanese may feel that s/he has to continue the conversation, although to Jonson-san the conversation may have already become too long (he may be in a rush to get to his office). The expressions Jonson-san needs are 'Excuse me, I have to go now,' or 'Well, I'll see you,' or the like. The following are expressions that can be used in the above situation:

Jaa, mata. Well, (see you) again

Jaa, gomen kudasai. Well, excuse me (I have to go)

Note that Sayoonara would sound a little odd in the above situation, for it is usually used when the speaker thinks s/he will not meet the hearer again, at least on the same day.

If a similar conversation takes place late in the evening, **Oyasuminasai** 'Good night' is also appropriate in place of mata 'again.' You can use **Gomen kudasai** here, too.

4. Set expressions for greetings

Itte (i)rasshai.See you. Good-bye.Itte mairimasu.See you. Good-bye.

The expression Itte irasshai literally means 'Please go and come back,' and Itte mairimasu means 'I'll go and come back.' These expressions are exchanged in a home when a family member leaves. The person going out says Itte mairimasu or Itte kimasu and those remaining say Itte (i)rasshai.

These expressions are also used among non-family members when they feel that they belong to the same group. The concept of 'group' differs in its range depending on the individual, but usually people living in a neighborhood or people working at the same company would be regarded as members of a group.

Ordinarily, you should respond to Itte irasshai by saying Itte mairimasu. However, once you have said Jaa, mata or Jaa, gomen kudasai, you don't have to reply to Itte irasshai.

Tadaima I'm back.
Okaerinasai. Welcome home.

Tadaima literally means 'right now' and is said by the person who has returned. The person who has been waiting for the person who has returned says Okaerinasai, which literally means 'You have come home.' In English, people use various expressions when leaving and coming home but in Japan set expressions are used for these occasions. Such expressions as Konnichiwa, Konbanwa or Sayoonara are not used among family members.

5. The four seasons and the Japanese climate

Japan has four seasons, each three months long. March through May are the spring months; June through August, the summer months; September through November, the fall months; and December through February, the winter months. Spring, summer, fall, and winter are called in Japanese haru, natsu, aki, and fuyu, respectively. In Japanese, months are literally referred to as 'the first month,' 'the second month,' etc., which corresponds to January, February, etc., in English. The following names of the seasons and months are given for reference:

6. How to describe the temperature in Japanese

As mentioned in previous lessons, since the metric system is used in Japan, temperatures are indicated in Centigrade rather than in Fahrenheit as in the U.S. The following is a conversion table between Centigrade and Fahrenheit:

Conversion Formulas

To convert Fahrenheit to Centigrade, subtract 32 from Fahrenheit and divide by 1.8:

To convert Centigrade to Fahrenheit, multiply Centigrade by 1.8 and add 32:

Fahrenheit = Centigrade x 1.8 + 32

The counter used in giving temperatures is **-do** 'degree,' and the pronunciation of numbers before this counter is the same as in the simple counting of numbers.

Examples:

5 degrees go-do

34 degrees sanjuu yon-do

USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. Shokken (食寿) 'meal ticket'

At some restaurants--department store dining halls, for example, you are required to buy a shokken (食寿) 'meal ticket' at the shokken uriba (食寿壳場), which is located at the entrance. After you buy a shokken, give it to the waitress or waiter at your table. The waiter/waitress will then bring you the dish. When you finish the meal, you simply leave the restaurant.

To buy a shokken, you need to know the name of the dish you want. At department store dining halls as well as at many other places, there is a window near the entrance in which plastic samples of available dishes are displayed. The name of the dish and its price are placed in front of each sample. Therefore, what you do is look at the display, decide on a dish, and give its name and the money to the attendant at the shokken uriba. If you can't read the name of the dish you want, you can ask a Japanese person to buy a shokken for you by pointing to the dish in the display. You can use the following expression for this purpose

Kore no shokken o katte kudasaimasen ka?

Would you please buy a meal ticket for this dish?

You may have noticed that in the above sentence, the phrase kudasaimasen ka is used after the verb katte 'buy'. As you studied earlier, you can express the same meaning by using kudasai, as in the following

Kore no shokken o katte kudasai.

Please buy a meal ticket for this one

However, as indicated by the difference in the translations of the two sentences, the first sentence is more polite than the second one. Since you are asking a stranger for a favor, it is more appropriate to use the more polite expression, i.e., the first sentence.

2. Seating

With the exception of some western-style restaurants and expensive Japanese restaurants, you don't have to wait to be seated. You may simply take any unoccupied seat. However, if the restaurant you are in is crowded, you may have to share a table with someone else. If such is the case, you should ask the person already at the table if it's all right to take the seat by saying.

Koko ii desu ka?May I sit here? (literally, 'Is here O K?')

The Japanese will probably say

(Ee,) ii desu yo. Sure /Please

You can pretty well guess when the seat is already taken by observing the person's attitude, even if you don't understand what is being said. A refusal will probably begin with an apology.

When you are with several people at a restaurant where someone seats you, the waiter/waitress will probably ask you how many people there are in your group by saying:

Nan-nin-sama desu ka? How

How many people are there?

After getting the number from you, s/he will take you to a table by saying:

Kochira e doozo.

This way, please.

When you want to call a waiter/waitress for service, you can say:

Sumimasen.

Excuse me.

When a waiter/waitress comes to your table, s/he will first say Irasshaimase 'Welcome' and will probably then say:

Nan ni itashimashoo ka?

What shall we serve you?

OR

Nan ni nasaimasu ka?

What would you like?

The above two expressions are comparable to 'May I take your order?' or 'Would you like to order?' in English.

3. How to find the dish you want

In some restaurants, menus are written both in Japanese and English. If you don't see an English menu on the table, you may want to find out if they have one. You can use the following expression:

Eego no menyuu wa arimasu ka?

Do you have an English menu? (cf. Lesson 4)

If the restaurant doesn't have an English menu but has a display window outside, you can ask the waiter/waitress to come with you to the display by saying:

Chotto issho ni kite kudasaimasen ka?

Would you please come with me?

The word chotto in the above sentence literally means 'a little bit'. It is used to soften the tone of the request and should not be taken literally.

You may wonder what you should do if the restaurant you are in has neither an English menu nor plastic samples. One way to cope with such a situation is to ask if they serve a dish you like. (You must know the name of the dish in Japanese, of course.) You can use the following expression for this purpose:

(dish name) wa arimasu ka?

Do you serve (dish name)?

Another way out of this dilemma is to see if anyone at another table is eating a dish that attracts you. If you see a dish you like, you can order the same by saying:

Are onegai shimasu.

That one, please.

If the restaurant doesn't have a dish you want and you don't want to bother, you can say Jaa, mata kimasu 'I'll come again' and leave the place to find a restaurant that has plastic samples outside.



USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. How to indicate that you are ready to place an order

You can place an order with any waitress you see, not necessarily the one that waited on you first. When you want to call a waitress to place an order, you can say

Sumimasen. Onegai shimasu.

I would like to place an order

Sumimasen acts as an attention getter. The expression onegal shimasu, which you've already encountered a number of times, literally means something like 'I'm going to make a request' or 'I'm making a request' When used in the above situation, it indicates that you're asking for service

If you are not yet ready to order, you can say the following to the waitress or waiter:

Chotto matte kudasai.

Please wait a moment

The waitress/waiter may wait at your table or may leave your table and return when you call her/him.

2. Useful expressions to know in placing an order

When the waitress or waiter comes to your table to take your order, s/he will probably say.

Nan ni nasaimasu ka? Nan ni itashimashooka?

What would you like to order?

Okimari ni narimashita ka?

Have you decided yet? Are you ready to order?

What is your order?

Gochuumon wa?

Are you going to place an order?

The simplest way of placing your order is to point to the item on the menu and say

Kore onegai shimasu.

This, please (cf. Lesson 15)

Kore kudasai.

Please give me this (cf. Lesson 18)

When you order a certain number of servings of food or drinks, you can use the following pattern, which is similar to the one you studied in Lesson 18.

(food/drink) number + counter + **onegai shimasu**. (cf. [merchandise] number + counter + **kudasai** in Lesson 18)

Tenpura san-ninmae onegai shimasu. Hankachi ni-mai onegai shimasu.

As we discussed earlier, the Japanese use different counters for different types of objects. For example, when they refer to (train) tickets, they use the counter...mai, as in the following examples:

Yokohama, ichi-mai. One ticket to Yokohama. Kyoto, ni-mai. Two tickets to Kyoto.

When the Japanese refer to people, they use the counter...ri for the numbers one and two and ...nin for the numbers larger than two, as in the following examples:

hitori one person
futari two persons
san-nin three persons
yo-nin four persons
go-nin five persons
roku-nin six persons
juu-nin ten persons

The following are some counters that are frequently used in restaurants:

...hon: used for cylindrical objects like bottles

biiru ip-ponone bottle of beer(o)sake ni-hontwo bottles of sakesan-bonthree bottlesrop-ponsix bottles

...ninmae: used in counting servings of a dish

tenpura ichi-ninmaeone portion of tenpurasashimi ni-ninmaetwo servings of sashimisan-ninmaethree servings

yo-ninmae four servings

You also learned that the counter . . .tsu can be used with the native Japanese numerals (numbers one to ten) when referring to the number of corners, intersections, etc. This counter is also used in a shopping situation like the following:

Kore o mittsu kudasai. Please give me three of these.

(cf. Lesson 18)

Lesson 22 Placing an order

In Lesson 18, we mentioned that when you are not sure of the appropriate counter, you can use . . .tsu. The amount expressed in this way is usually comprehensible to the Japanese, although it may sound a little odd. This is also true when placing an order at a restaurant. Although there are specific counters used for bottles, servings, etc., as we discussed above, if you can use the counter . . .tsu correctly, you should be able to place an order at a restaurant. Here are some examples:

Biiru hitotsu onegai shimasu. One (bottle of) beer, please.

Sashimi futatsu onegai shimasu. Two (servings of) sashimi, please.

When you want to place an additional order, you can use the following pattern:

(Food/drink) moo + number + ...tsu onegai shimasu.

Thus, when you want to order two more bottles of sake, you can say:

(O)sake moo ni-hon (OR moo futatsu) onegai shimasu. Two more bottles of sake, please.

USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. Finding out about the taste of a dish

When you want to try a new dish whose name you don't know, you may want to ask about its taste. In this lesson, you will learn the following 'taste' words

shiokarai salty
karai hot, spicy
suppai sour
amai sweet
nigai bitter

With the help of your instructor, add any additional words that you think you will need.

Suppose you want to try a beef dish. If you ask a waitress/waiter where the beef dishes are on the menu by saying Biifu wa doko desu ka?, s/he will probably point to them. Before you make a selection, you may want to know the way the dish is cooked. The following are some of the words you can use in such a situation. (Again, ask the instructor for more words if you think it necessary.)

ageta fried

nita cooked in broth

yaita grilled yudeta boiled nama no raw

The above words can be used in the following way:

Kore wa yaita sakana desu ka? Is this grilled fish?

When you want to make sure of the taste of the dish you have chosen, you can use the above 'taste words' in the following way.

Kore wa (taste word) **desu ka?**Is this one (taste word)?

For example, if you want to ask whether the dish is salty or not, you can say:

Kore wa shiokarai desu ka? Is this one salty?

If the dish isn't salty, the waiter/waitress will often use the word shiokaraku, as in Shiokaraku arimasen OR Shiokaraku gozaimasen. The change from shiokarai to shiokaraku is exactly the same as that from tooi 'far' to tooku (arimasen) 'not far' (Lesson 10).

The following is a summary of the negative forms of the taste words:

affirmative form negative form

shiokarai (desu)
karai (desu)
amai (desu)
suppai (desu)
nigai (desu)
shiokaraku arimasen
karaku arimasen
amaku arimasen
suppaku arimasen
nigaku arimasen

2. Hai as 'No' and lie as 'Yes'

In English, when you want to find out if a dish has a taste you don't like, you will often say something like 'Is this salty?' In Japanese, however, you usually ask a negative question as in the following example:

Kore wa karaku arimasen ka? Isn't this salty?

This is softer and politer to the Japanese ear than the more direct English question, though you will be understood if you ask 'ls it salty?'.

The English and Japanese answers to the above question are also quite different. In English, when the dish isn't salty you say 'No' while when it is you say 'Yes'. But in Japanese, when it isn't salty you say <u>Hai</u> and when it is you say <u>lie</u>. In Japanese, you respond to the whole content of the question rather than to a part of the content as in English. To the Japanese, the question means. 'Is it the case that the dish isn't salty?' If it is so (that the dish isn't salty), you reply <u>Hai</u> 'yes', and if it's not the case (the dish is salty), you reply <u>lie</u> 'no'. Thus, if you ask a waitress the above question and the waitress answers <u>Hai</u>, it means that she thinks <u>it's the case that the dish isn't salty</u>. Likewise, if she says lie, she means that <u>it isn't the case that the dish isn't salty</u>).

Of course, you can avoid problems that may be caused by this type of question if you use a simple question like **Kore wa shiokarai desu ka?** However, without the knowledge of this difference, you may not always be able to react correctly to what is said to you by Japanese.

Another important thing to keep in mind is that Japanese whose English is imperfect may answer negative questions in English in the same way as they would in Japanese. For example, if you ask such a person 'Don't you want to come?' s/he may answer something like 'No, I want to come' or simply 'No' meaning 'Yes, I do.'

3. Which dish do you recommend?

In some cases, you may want to ask a waiter/waitress what dish s/he recommends. For example, after finding the type of dish you want, you may still not be sure which one to order.

In such a case, you can ask:

Dore ga oishii desu ka? Which one is good?

Which one would you recommend?

Of course, if the waiter/waitress points to a dish, then that is the one s/he recommends. (You don't really need to understand accurately what s/he is saying.) If s/he doesn't point to anything and says something you don't understand, you can ask:

Dore desu ka?

Which one is it?

If you want what s/he points to, you can say:

Sore kudasai. Sore onegai shimasu. Please give me that.

4. Paying the check and leaving the restaurant

If a waiter/waitress doesn't leave your check on the table, you can ask for it by saying:

Okanjoo onegai shimasu.

Check, please.

The word **(o)kanjoo** literally means 'calculation.' Thus, the above sentence literally means 'Please calculate (how much I owe you OR how much I should pay).'

Depending on the restaurant, you can pay the check either to a waiter/waitress or to the cashier. If you are not sure, ask a waiter/waitress by saying:

Okanjoo wa doko desu ka?

Where do I pay?

If you can pay the waiter/waitress directly, s/he will say something like the following:

Koko/kochira de onegai shimasu.

Here, please.

S/he then will take the money to the cashier and bring back your change, if any. If you are supposed to pay the cashier, s/he will say something like:

Achira desu.

Over there.

Achira de onegai shimasu.

(Pay) over there, please.

She may use the word reji 'cashier' (from 'register') instead of achira as in the following:

Reji de onegai shimasu.

(Pay at) the cashier, please.

When you leave, the cashier or the waiter/waitress will probably say:

Maido/doomo arigatoo gozaimashita.

Mata doozo.

Thank you very much. Please come again.

Although it isn't necessary for you to say anything (just as in a shopping situation), Japanese people often say that they enjoyed the meal. If you want to do the same, you can use the following expression:

Gochisoosama (deshita).

I've enjoyed the meal.

USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. How to get the person you want to talk to

In this lesson, you will learn expressions to use when you place or answer a telephone call at home.

Moshi moshi is used exactly like 'hello' in an English telephone conversation--you can use it when you begin a conversation or you can use it when you have a bad connection. Thus, in most cases the person who answers will first say moshi moshi. However, in some homes, the person may say the name first without moshi moshi. In that case, the person will say:

(name) de gozaimasu.

This is (name)'s residence.

After getting an answer, you usually make sure that you are calling the right place (except when the person says his/her name first). You can do this by asking:

(name)-san no otaku desu ka?

Is this (name)'s residence?

If it's the right place, the person who answers will probably say the following:

Hai, soo desu.

or

Hai, sayoo de gozaimasu.

Yes, it is.

Sayoo de gozaimasu is a more polite equivalent of Soo desu. Ordinarily, people tend to use especially polite and humble expressions in telephone conversation. One reason for this is that in a conversation that is not face-to-face, there is no way to show politeness except through very polite language. Bowing, for example, will not do any good.

If you reach a wrong number, the person who answers will probably say:

(lie), chigaimasu (yo).

No, it isn't.

Then apologize for the wrong number. You can use the following familiar expression:

Doomo sumimasen.

I'm sorry.

Then the person will probably reply by saying the following:

lie (doo itashimashite).

No, (not at all).

After confirming that the place you are calling is the right one, you ask for the person you want to talk to. For this purpose, you can use the following expression:

(name)-san irasshaimasu ka?

Is (name) in/at home?

If you want to talk to Mr. Tanaka, for example, you can say either:

Tanaka-san irasshaimasu ka?

OR

Goshujin irasshaimasu ka?

As you learned in Lesson 5, goshujin refers to someone else's husband. However, the word literally means 'master/head (of the house)'.

Thus, even if the person who answers is not the wife, you can still use the word goshujin in the above situation. The same thing applies when you are calling Mrs. Tanaka. You can use the word okusan no matter who answers the telephone.

If the person who answers the telephone is the one you want, s/he will probably say:

Wata(ku)shi desu (ga).

Speaking. (literally, 'It's me, but... [what do you want?]')

When the person who answers leaves the phone to get the person you want, s/he will probably say the following:

Chotto matte kudasai.

OR

Shooshoo omachi kudasai.

Please wait a moment.

Shooshoo is politer than chotto (both mean 'a little bit'), and omachi kudasai is politer than matte kudasai.

When you ask for the person you want, it is appropriate to identify yourself both by name and company affiliation. (This way you also avoid being asked who you are.) You can use the following expression for this purpose:

(work place) no (name) desu.

I'm (name) of (work place).

Thus, if you want to talk to Mr. Tanaka, you will say something like the following:

Amerika Taishikan no (your name) desu ga, goshujin irasshaimasu ka? I'm (your name) from the American Embassy May I talk to Mr. Tanaka/your husband, etc.?

2. How to answer a call

What has been discussed above also applies when you answer a call.

When you want to know who the caller is, you can use the following expression, which is comparable to `May I ask who is calling?' in English:

Shitsuree desu ga, donata desu ka? Excuse me, but who is calling?

If the caller is a friend of yours or your husband/wife's, s/he may skip a step or use less formal expressions.

Lesson 24 Opening a telephone conversation

For example, the person may not ask ... san no otaku desu ka? but instead ask immediately for the person s/he wants. S/he may also say ... -san onegai shimasu 'Mr./Mrs..., please' rather than ...-san irasshaimasu ka?

At any rate, although the general procedure is relatively routine, you can't accurately predict what the caller will say. Therefore, whenever you have difficulty, you can use the following familiar expressions:

Nihongo ga yoku wakarimasen. I don't understand Japanese well.

Moo sukoshi yukkuri itte Please say it more slowly. kudasaimasen ka?

Moo ichi-do yukkuri itte Please repeat slowly. kudasaimasen ka?

...san desu ne? It's ... isn't it?

3. How to use public telephones

Different types of telephones are distinguished by their color. Public pay telephones in street booths are blue; semi-public pay phones in front of stores, in shops, and in certain public places are pink and red.

All coin-operated public phones can be used for local and short-distance calls taking up to six 10-yen coins. All pay phones, except yellow and green ones, are operated with 10-yen coins.

The yellow and green phones, used for long-distance calls, take both 10-yen and 100-yen coins. Only green telephones accept special 'telephone cards' which may be purchased in amounts of 500-yen or more at many small shops. The current value of the card is displayed on the telephone and the cost of the call is automatically deducted.

Phone numbers are composed of three groups of numbers. When making calls within Tokyo, dial just the last two groups, or seven digits in all.

The first group of digits is for connection with the long-distance exchange when making domestic inter-city calls. In this case, dial all the numbers in sequence.

How to use a pay phone:

- 1. pick up the receiver
- 2. insert a 10-yen coin
- 3. dial the number

A call is limited to three minutes, but on some phones it can be continued if you insert another 10-yen coin before the three minutes are up. If you put in more coins than necessary, they will be returned after the call is finished.

On some phones, the call will be automatically disconnected after three minutes.

USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. How to call a person at his/her office

When you call a person at his/her office, the operator will probably say the name of the company after using a greeting expression (without moshi moshi). For example, if you are calling Mitsubishi Shooji 'Mitsubishi Trading Company' in the morning, the operator will probably say.

Ohayoo gozaimasu. Mitsubishi Shooji de gozaimasu.

Good Morning This is Mitsubishi Trading Company

If you know the extension number, you can say the following to the operator:

Naisen xxx onegai shimasu.

Extension xxx, please

As you learned in Lesson 10, phone numbers in Japanese are simply read out as in English. Thus, extension number 123 is read Naisen ichi ni san. It should be noted that you can't use kudasai for onegai shimasu in the above sentence. You learned that kudasai and onegai shimasu can be used interchangeably in buying merchandise or placing an order at a restaurant. However, the word kudasai (without a verb in front of it) is normally used when you ask someone to give you some concrete objects. Thus, when you ask for an extension number, person, section, or department on the phone, only onegai shimasu is possible.

If you don't have the extension number, you can give the name of the section or department to the operator:

... ka/bu onegai shimasu.

section/department, please.

For example, if you are calling the jinji-ka `personnel section,' you can say:

Jinji-ka onegai shimasu.

Personnel Office, please

The operator will probably reply by saying one or both of the following:

Shooshoo omachi kudasai.

Please wait a moment

Otsunagi shimasu/itashimasu.

I'll connect you

The person who answers in the section/department will give the name of the department first, as illustrated below

Jinji-ka desu/de gozaimasu.

This is the Personnel office

When you ask for the person you want, you can say

... san onegai shimasu.

Mr. ., please

When a Japanese person calls someone at their office, s/he usually uses the title of the person after their name. Thus, if you are calling Mr. Tanaka, who is a section chief, you will say:

Tanaka-kachoo onegai shimasu. Section Chief Tanaka, please.

Occasionally, the office you are calling has more than one person with the same name. This is especially true when you are calling someone whose name is Tanaka, Yamada, or some other very common name. In this case, if you give the title of the person, the person who answers the phone will be able to more easily identify who you want. Another advantage to using a title is that even if you don't know the name of the person, you still have a good chance of getting through without extended explanations.

Kachoo-san onegai shimasu. The section chief, please.

In the above example, the address term . . . san is used after the title. The use of the address term makes the sentence softer and more polite. If you don't use this word, the implication is that your position is higher than that of person you are calling.

It is best, whenever you can, to make sure that you know the name of the person before calling and to use the neutral expression (name)-san. This will avoid problems that may be caused by misuse of the title. However, it is worth knowing that the title is used in the above manner by the Japanese, especially when you are answering a call in your office.

2. How to answer a call in your office

What has been discussed above also applies when you answer a call in your office. For example, if you answer the phone for the American Embassy, the first thing you will say is:

(Greeting) Amerika Taishikan de gozaimasu. (Greeting) This is the American Embassy.

If you are answering in the visa section, your first utterance will be:

Sashoo-ka de gozaimasu. The visa section.

(Sashoo is the Japanese word for 'visa')

The caller may ask for your boss by saying . . .san onegai shimasu. Alternatively, s/he may ask for your boss by giving only his/her title (and . . .san). What is important is that you are supposed to use more polite (or more humble) expressions when you answer the phone. This is because the Japanese think you are answering the phone on behalf of your office.

Thus, de gozaimasu is more appropriate than desu. Likewise, Shooshoo omachi kudasai 'Please wait a moment' is more appropriate than Chotto matte kudasai. We will continue our discussion of more polite (and more humble) expressions used in telephone conversations in the next lesson.

USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. How to say '(name) isn't in now'

When you are answering a call, you may need to say that the person the caller wants is not in. Look at the following

Caller: Howaito-san onegai shimasu. Mr White, please Answerer: Howaito wa ima orimasen ga... White isn't in now

As you may have noticed, the person who answered didn't use -san after the name in the above conversation. This is because the person is answering the phone on behalf of the institution s/he belongs to. (Cf. Lesson 5 for the in-group/out-group distinction.) Thus, when the person mentions an in-group member, s/he is expected to treat the person as s/he would herself/himself (cf. Lesson 5). When you greet a Japanese colleague by the name of Yamamoto in the morning, you will say

Yamamoto-san, ohayoo gozaimasu.

Good morning, Mr Yamamoto

However, when you mention him to an out-group member on the phone (i.e., when you are acting on behalf of your institution), you will say:

Yamamoto wa ima orimasen ga. . .

Yamamoto isn't in now

In Lesson 24, you learned that when you ask for a person on the phone, you can say:

(name)-san irasshaimasu ka?

Is (name) in?

The word irasshaimasu is the more polite form of imasu. Thus, the above sentence indicates that the speaker is showing respect to the person s/he is referring to. However, when you refer to an in-group member, you use a deferential or humble expression so that your speech sounds polite to the hearer. The word orimasu is the humble form of imasu. This is why the person who answered in the conversation above said Orimasen ga rather than Irasshaimasen ga or Imasen ga.

The following is a summary of the above:

(when you ask if an out-group person

(when you say an in-group

person isn't in)

X-san irasshaimasu ka?

X wa ima orimasen ga. . .

Is Mr X In?

X isn't in now

Although respectful or humble words are more appropriate in the above situations, the neutral word imasu can be used without being offensive, as in the following:

X-san wa imasu ka?

X wa ima imasen ga. . .

2. How to say 'I'll call again'

When the person you want is not in, you may wish to leave a message. However, the contents of the message may be too complex to express in Japanese. In such a case, you may wish to say 'I'll call again' in Japanese, so that you can call at another time (or avoid possible difficulties in comprehending what the person on the line says). You can use the following expression for this purpose:

Mata odenwa shimasu. I'll call again.

3. 'Is there someone (there) who understands English?'

You may wonder what the person on the line will say when the person you want is absent. The following are some key words and expressions you will need to know to understand what you hear:

(X wa) kyoo wa yasunde imasu. X is absent today.

OR
(X wa) ima seki o hazushite imasu. X isn't at his/her desk at the moment.

Although you can say Mata odenwa shimasu 'I'll call again,' if you have urgent business you may want to talk to a person who understands English.

The following is the expression to use in such a case:

Eego ga wakaru hito wa imasu/imasen ka?

Is there someone who understands English?

Likewise, when you are answering a call and have difficulty understanding what the caller is saying, you may want to say something like 'I'll switch with a person who understands Japanese.' You can use the following expression for this purpose:

Nihongo ga wakaru mono to kawarimasu.

I'll switch with a person who understands Japanese.

Compare the expressions eego ga wakaru hito 'person who understands English' and nihongo ga wakaru mono 'person who understands Japanese.' You may have noticed that the word hito is used in the first expression and mono in the second, although both mean 'person.' This is another example of the in-group/out-group distinction. The word mono is used when you refer to an in-group person while hito is used when you refer to an out-group person. Mono is humble while hito is neutral.



USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. What to do when you are involved in a car accident

When you are involved in a car accident, ask anyone around for help. When you want to say that there has been a car accident, you can say the following:

Kuruma no jiko desu. There has been (literally, 'it is') a car

accident

If there are any injured persons, say:

Keganin ga imasu. There are injured persons

If you want to ask someone to call an ambulance, the police, and/or a doctor, you can use the following words and expressions:

kyuukyuusha ambulance keesatsu police isha doctor

Kyuukyuusha/keesatsu/ishaPlease call an ambulance/the police/

o yonde kudasai. a doctor

It is a good idea always to carry with you a card with the telephone numbers of the U.S. Embassy and other places you might wish to call in an emergency. Your meeshi can also be quite useful. If you wish to have someone make a call to a number you have written down, you can say:

Koko ni denwa shite kudasai. Please telephone this place

Denwa means `telephone' and the phrase denwa site (kudasai) means `please phone' The particle ni is used after the name of the place you want to contact. When you want to make a phone call, you can say:

Denwa sitain desu. I want to make a call

Likewise, if you want to call the American Embassy, you can say:

Amerika Taishikan ni denwa shitain desu.

Lesson 27 Emergencies

You should contact your office immediately if you are involved in an accident so that they can send help or give you suggestions as to what to do.

When you need to talk with the police, show them your meeshi first. It will give them much of the information they need.

When you call the police or an ambulance yourself, dial the following numbers:

police 110 fire/ambulance 119

However, since the police or fire department will ask you about the details of the accident, it will be far easier to handle the situation if you can find a Japanese person to help you.

2. Some basic expressions for describing symptoms

Although describing medical symptoms in a foreign language can be extremely difficult, if you know the following basic expressions you can at least tell your doctor that you have nausea, that you feel dizzy, or where you have pain, etc.

Koko ga itain desu. I have a pain here. Hakike ga shimasu. I feel nauseous.

Kimochi ga waruin desu. I feel sick.







USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. When things break

If you live in an apartment and there are electrical or plumbing problems, you should contact the kanri-nin(管理人) 'resident manager' for help. However, the kanri-nin may or may not speak English. If s/he doesn't, you may have to describe the problem in Japanese and ask him/her to come up to your apartment to check or to call a repairman for you. The following expressions can be used to describe some of the problems you may encounter:

X ga koshoo shimashita. X is out of order.

X ga kowaremashita. X is broken.

In place of X above, you can use the following words:

suidoo waterworks, plumbing

reizooko refrigerator

nagashi sınk

renji range, stove

Note also the following useful expressions:

Mizu ga demasen. The water doesn't come out.

Denki ga tsukimasen. The electricity isn't working.

When you want to ask your resident manager to come and check, you can use the following expressions:

Shirabete kudasaimasen ka? Would you check it? Mite kudasaimasen ka? Could you look at it?

If you want to ask the resident manager to call a repairman, you can use the following expression:

X o yonde kudasaimasen ka? Will you call X?

In place of X above, you can use the following words:

suidoo-ya plumber denki-ya electrician,

electric appliance repairman

Lesson 28 Getting things fixed

When you want to explain the problem in more detail to a kanri-nin or repairman, you can use the following expressions:

Koko ga kowaremashita. This part (place) is broken.

Kore ga kowaremashita. This is broken.

Ask your instructor for other words and expressions you think you may need. When you want to take an appliance to a repair shop, you can, of course, use the expressions that describe the problems mentioned above. You may also say the following to the repairman:

Naoshite kudasaimasen ka? Will you fix it?

You may also want to ask when the repaired item will be ready. You can use the following expression for this purpose:

Itsu dekimasu ka? When will it be ready?

In order to comprehend the repairman's answer, you have to know dates as well as days and weeks in Japanese (cf. Lesson 10 and 20 as well as chart on page 516).

2. About electrical Equipment

Electric current (voltage) in Japan is 100-110, which is about 9% lower than in the U.S., which is 110-120. In the western half of Japan (Kyoto, Osaka, Kobe, etc.), the cycles are the same as in the U.S.-- 60 cycles. However, 50 cycles is normal in the eastern half of the country, including Tokyo. Therefore, if you work in Tokyo and want to send or take electrical appliances with motors from the U.S., you will need to have them adjusted in Japan before using them. Electric clocks are often impractical to convert. Many appliances, such as toasters, are not affected by cycle level.

USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

Shall we go and see. . .? 1.

In this lesson we take up the following expressions, which may be used by Japanese when they ask you to go out for a drink or dinner:

Nomi ni ikimasen ka?

Shall we go out for a drink?

Shokuji ni ikimasen ka?

Shall we go out for dinner?

When a person asks you if you can go out to see a play, exhibition, etc. with them, they may use a similar expression, such as the following:

(Kabuki) o mi ni ikimasen ka?

Shall we go and see a (Kabuki play)?

2. Deciding the place and time to meet

It may sometimes be necessary to discuss the place and time to meet to go see a play, sumo, etc. When you want to propose a place and time and find out if the proposed place and time are convenient for the other person, you can use the following expressions:

(Time) wa doo desu ka?

How about (time)?

(Place) wa doo desu ka?

How about (place)?

For example, if you want to propose meeting in front of Mitsukoshi at 3:00, you can say:

Mitsukoshi no mae 3-ji wa doo desu ka?

3-ji Mitsukoshi no mae wa doo desu ka?

How about in front of Mitsukoshi at three?

Another way to propose a time and place to meet is to use one of the following expressions:

time:

(Time) ni aimashoo ka?

Shall we meet at (time)?

place: (Place) de aimashoo ka?

Shall we meet at (place)?

place & time: (Place) de (time) ni aimashoo ka?

(Time) ni (place) de aimashoo ka?

For example, when you want to propose meeting in front of Mitsukoshi at 3:00 on the 4th, you can say:

Yokka 3-ji ni Mitsukoshi no mae de aimashoo ka?
OR

Mitsukoshi no mae de yokka 3-ji ni aimashoo ka? Shall we meet in front of Mitsukoshi at 3:00 on the 4th?

It should be noted that the particle ni is used after the time expression while de is used after the place expression.

When you want to ask a person about a convenient time and place, you can ask the following questions:

Nan-ji ni aimashoo ka? What time shall we meet?

Doko de aimashoo ka? Where shall we meet?

The following are some time expressions that don't require ni after them:

ashita OR asu tomorrow

asatte the day after tomorrow

Ashita aimashoo ka? Shall we meet tomorrow?

Listed below are some of the favorite places the Japanese go for drinks:

bia gaadenbeer gardensunakkusnack barbaabar

yakitori-ya chicken-barbecue place

When a Japanese suggests a bar, for example, by saying Baa wa doo desu ka but you want to go some other place, you can reply by proposing the place you want to go, as in the following:

Soo desu ne... (place you want to go) wa doo desu ka? *Well... How about (place)?*

When Japanese ask you to go out to dinner with them, they may say the following:

(Konban) shokuji ni ikimasen ka?Shall we go out for a meal this evening?

You may want to discuss the kind of cuisine you are going to have. The following are some words for different types of cuisines:

Nihon-ryoori OR washoku Japanese cuisine

3. Deciding the time

After deciding where to go, you will probably talk about the time. You can use this formula

(Time) wa doo desu ka?

How about (time)?

If you agree to the proposed time, you can say

Ee, ii desu yo.

Yes, that is fine

Another way to discuss the time to meet is to use the following expression

(Time) ni shimashoo ka?

Shall we make it (time)?

For example, if you want to suggest that you meet at 7 00 p m, you can say

Shichi-ji ni shimashoo ka?

Shall we make it 7 00 p m ?

Note again that the particle ni is used after the time expression. The word shimashoo means 'let's do' and shimashoo ka means 'shall we 2'

The expression ni shimashoo ka 'shall we make it ?' is also frequently used to propose things other than time For example

Baa ni shimashoo ka?

Shall we make it a bar?

Chuugoku-ryoori ni shimashoo ka? Shall we decide on Chinese food?

When you want to express agreement to the above questions, you can say

(Ee), soo shimashoo.

Yes, let's do so

Buying tickets 4.

Tickets for major plays, sports, movies, etc. are usually available at puree gaido ($\mathcal{T} \ \nu -$ カイト), which are located in department stores and other major shopping areas

The expressions used in buying tickets for entertainment are similar to those used when buying train tickets except that you have to specify the date. Look at the following example

15-nichi no kippu 3-mai onegai shimasu.

Three tickets for (the performance) on the 15th

Tooka no hiru no bu no kippu wa arimasu ka?

Do you have tickets available for the afternoon performance on the 10th?

5. How to ask someone to go out to dinner or for drinks

Japanese, especially men, often go out for a few drinks after work. It may happen that a Japanese colleague of yours will ask you to go out together after work. In that case, the person may say the following:

Konban nomi ni ikimasen ka? Shall we go out for a drink/dinner tonight?

If you feel like doing so, you can say:

Sore wa ii desu ne. That would be great.

If you don't feel like going, you can say:

Kyoo wa chotto... Today is (not so good for me.)

The Japanese may then propose a different day by saying:

Jaa, ashita wa doo desu ka? How about tomorrow, then?

The expression ...wa doo desu ka? is comparable to 'How about ...?' in English. Thus, when a Japanese proposes a place to go to, s/he may say:

(Place) wa doo desu ka? How about (place)?

If you can go out the next day, you can say:

(Ee), ii desu yo. Fine.

If you can't, then use the following expression:

Ashita mo chotto... Tomorrow is also (not so good for me.)

The Japanese may propose another day or s/he may give up inviting you, by saying:

Jaa, mata sono uchi ni. Well, then, sometime in the near future.

USAGE NOTES & HINTS FOR CONVERSATION

1. When you visit a Japanese home

When a Japanese visits someone's home, the person usually brings a little gift with them such as candy, cookies, etc. Although Japanese may not expect a foreigner to do the same, it is often a good idea to follow suit. Such gifts are usually given right after exchanging greetings.

When a Japanese greets you at the genkan 'entrance hall,' the person will probably say Irasshai 'welcome' first. Other greeting expressions used in this situation are exactly the same as those you would use elsewhere, e.g., konnichiwa, atsui desu ne, etc. When you meet your friend's family members for the first time, you have to, of course, introduce yourself. When you want to give the gift you have brought with you, you can say Kore o doozo 'This is for you' (lit. '[take] this please.'). When a Japanese leads you to the living room, the person will probably say something like the following:

(Doozo) kochira e.
OR
Kochira e doozo.

This way, please.

2. When you want to take leave

When you want to take leave, you can say Sorosoro shitsuree shimasu 'Please excuse me, (I have to go now).' In most cases, the Japanese will probably ask you to stay longer by saying something like Mada yoroshii deshoo? 'Can't you stay a little longer?' Although it is possible to respond by saying lie 'No', that expression sounds too direct and can be offending, for you are expected to decline an offer in an indirect manner. Perhaps a safer expression to use in this situation would be something like Ee, demo... 'Yes, but...', which indicates that you really want to stay longer but you have to leave (because you have something to do) or that you are afraid that you have stayed too long or that you have taken too much of your friend's time.

When you leave the house, the Japanese may ask you to come again by saying something like Mata kite kudasai 'Please come again.' Before saying sayoonara, it will be a good idea to thank the Japanese for the invitation by saying (Kyoo wa) doomo arigatoo gozaimashita.

3. When you have a Japanese guest

Most of the things that have been discussed above hold when you have a Japanese guest.

When you greet the Japanese, say Irasshai. Your Japanese guest may bring a little gift. Receive it graciously and say Doomo arigatoo gozaimasu. It should be noted, however, that you are not supposed to open the gift on receipt as you would do in the U.S. (Ask your instructor about this Japanese custom.) When you lead the person to your living room, you can say Kochira e doozo. When the person says that s/he would like to leave, ask him/her to stay longer by saying Mada ii deshoo? When the person leaves the house, ask him/her to visit you again by saying Mata kite kudasai.

4. Tanoshikatta desu 'I had a wonderful time.' (lit., It was enjoyable.)

Tanoshikatta desu is the past tense for Tanoshii desu (lit., 'It is enjoyable.'). The negative form for Tanoshikatta desu is Tanoshiku arimasen deshita (lit., 'It was not enjoyable.'). True adjectives change form in this way. For example, tooi 'far' changes as follows:

Tooi desu.It is far.Tooku arimasen.It is not far.Tookatta desu.It was far.Tooku arimasen deshita.It was not far.

5. Other sentiments

You may hear or have occasion to use the following expressions while in Japan. Discuss with your instructor how to use these expressions appropriately.

a. Omedetoo gozaimasu.

Congratulations.

This expression is used for weddings, graduations, promotions, births, birthdays, passing entrance exams and other happy occasions.

b. Shitsuree shimasu.

Excuse me. (lit., I'll do something rude.)

Generally, this is used when you are joining or leaving other people (e.g., entering a room, excusing yourself, etc.).

c. Shitsuree desu ga...

Excuse me. (lit., It is rude, but...)

This expression is used prior to asking personal questions (e.g., Shitsuree desu ga, donata desu ka?).

d. Zannen desu.

I'm sorry. (lit., It is regrettable.)

This is used to express regret, not anger. For example, it may be used after an exam is failed, after a party is missed, or when someone is absent when you visit their home.

e. Doozo osaki ni.

Please go before me.

Saki literally means 'first.' This expression is used when you ask someone to walk ahead of you or to do something else before you.

f. Osaki ni shitsuree shimasu.

Please excuse my going before you.

This expression is used whenever you do something before someone who is with you (e.g., walking through a doorway, getting up from a table, etc.).

g. Odaiji ni.

Take good care of yourself.

This expression is used whenever leaving the company of someone who is in poor health.

h. Ogenki de.

Good luck (to you). Take care.

This expression is used to say 'good-bye' to a social acquaintance you do not expect to see again soon.

i. Ki o tsukete.

Be careful.

This is used to urge someone to drive, walk, climb stairs, travel or do other things carefully and safely.

j. Itadakimasu.

'I am going to eat /drink.' This expression is used before one starts to eat or drink. Literally, it means 'I will receive.'

k. Gochisoosama deshita.

This means 'It was a feast.' This is used when someone has finished his/her meal or drink to express gratitude.
