

AN INTRODUCTORY GUIDE TO THE ROMANIAN LANGUAGE

Up to 30 million people are currently speaking Romanian. 20 million live in Romania (90 percent of the population); 3 million in the Republic of Moldova and about 1 million in neighboring countries (Ukraine, Hungary, the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Serbia and Montenegro, Bulgaria and Greece). There are also significant communities of Romanian language speakers in countries like Canada, United States, Germany, Israel, Australia, New Zealand, Italy and Spain.

Romanian is the only Eastern Romance language and most words in Romanian vocabulary (about 75 percent) are of Latin origin. This is why Romanian shares approximately 70 percent of its vocabulary with the other Romance languages, mostly Italian and French, followed by Sardinian, Catalan, Portuguese, Romansh, and Spanish. Over the centuries, Romanian has also borrowed many words from its Slavonic neighbors, German, Hungarian, Turkish, French and, more recently, from English.

The Romanian alphabet is based on the Latin alphabet, and has five additional letters (these are not diacriticals, but letters in their own right): ă, î, â, ş, and ţ. The Romanian alphabet is basically phonetic (with one exception: â - used inside the words - and î - used at the beginning or the end - both represent the same sound). The sounds denoted by letters are largely similar to Italian.

Note that a version of the Cyrillic alphabet was used in the Soviet Republic of Moldova until 1989, when they switched back to the Romanian version of the Latin alphabet.

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INTRODUCTION TO THE TRAINING

As you intend to come to Moldova it's important to learn enough Romanian so that you feel comfortable in your everyday communication with Moldovans. Peace Corps Moldova provides you a Pre Departure Online Training (P.DOT) that hopefully will give a general view about the language and sufficient useful information that will help you to communicate in the first days of your stay in Moldova.

Training consists of 19 lessons that combine basic phrases, words and grammar structures. Throughout the training you will have the opportunity to listen to a variety of dialogues, recorded by native Romanian speakers, and learn key phrases and basic grammatical concepts.

We are trying to use nontraditional teaching techniques that are based on listening and conversational approaches. The training aims to develop comprehension skills and competence in use of communicative functions. It does not underline the importance of spelling, grammar or knowing how to read and write, but the ability to communicate, to handle a simple conversation in everyday life situations. This is why we encourage you to listen to the lessons as many times as possible in order to get used to the pronunciation of words and expressions and then to have a basis for speaking.

We are aware of the fact that there are different methods of learning a foreign language that is why every audio lesson is accompanied by the written content (text).

Note: Any Romanian word starting with “e” is pronounced with an English “y” sound at the beginning.

Example: “este” is pronounced as yes-teh

Phonetic Variations:

ce : sounds like „che” in chest
 ci : sounds like „chee” in cheek
 che : sounds like „ke” in keg
 chi : sounds like „kee” in keen

ge : sounds like „je” in jet
 gi : sounds like „jea” in jeans
 ghe : sounds like „ge” in get
 ghi : sounds like „gea” in gear

Diphthongs:

Note: Put the two vowel sounds together to make the diphthong sound.

i (ee) + e (eh) = ie (yeh)
 o (oh) + a (ah) = oa (wah)

Lesson 6: Pronouns

A. The English pronouns (I, you, he, she, we, etc.) are the same in Romanian. The only exception is that Romanian has a singular and plural form for “you”. Let’s learn the pronouns:

ROMANIAN	ENGLISH
Eu	I
Tu	You
El	He
Ea	She
Noi	We
Voi	You (plural)
Ei	They (masculine)
Ele	They (feminine)

Notes:

1. If there is a group of masculine and feminine nouns, then it is always referred to by the pronoun ei.
2. If a person wishes to address someone (or group of people) in a formal tone, the speaker would use the pronoun **DUMNEAVOASTRĂ**. The verb's form for this pronoun is the same as for voi.

Lesson 7: Basic Verbs: “to be” & “to have”

Two of the most basic verbs in Romanian are “*a fi*” (to be) and “*a avea*” (to have). Let’s us learn the present tense conjugation of these verbs.

- **Eu săn student.** (I am a student.)
- **El nu e voluntar.** (He is not a volunteer.)
- **Mircea este inteligent.** (Mircea is intelligent.)

Examples:

- **Radu are un apartament.** (Radu has an apartment.)
- **Noi avem mulți prieteni.** (We have many friends.)
- **Tu nu ai bilet.** (You don't have a ticket.)

Notes:

1. From the examples above you can notice that the conjugation **este** can be shortened to **e**, and it is done quite often in spoken Romanian. It has the same meaning.
2. The negation of a verb is done by preceding it with **nu**. You can observe it in the examples above.

Lesson 8:

Articles

As in English, in Romanian the indefinite articles (*a, an, some*) precede the noun to which they refer.

A. Indefinite Articles

un	“ a, an ” for masculine singular nouns
o	“ a, an ” for feminine singular nouns
niște	some

Examples:

- **Adrian este un om bun.** (Adrian is a good man.)
- **Cristina are o carte.** (Cristina has a book.)
- **Niște copii sunt în fața școlii.** (Some kids are in front of the school.)

B. Definite Articles

But the definite articles in Romanian come after the noun, as a suffix.

If the word ends in a consonant, add **-ul**:

Indefinite (sng.)	om	man
Definite (pl.)	omul	the man
Indefinite (sng.)	oameni	men
Definite (pl.)	oamenii	the men

If the word ends in **-ă**, substitute **-a**:

Indefinite (sng.)	casă	house
Definite (pl.)	casa	the house
Indefinite (sng.)	case	houses
Definite (pl.)	casele	the houses

If ending in **-ea**, add **-ua**:

Indefinite (sng.)	cafea	coffee
Definite (pl.)	cafeaua	the coffee
Indefinite (sng.)	cafele	cups of coffee
Definite (pl.)	cafelele	the cups of coffee

If ending in **-u**, add **-l**:

Indefinite (sng.)	erou	hero
Definite (pl.)	eroul	the hero
Indefinite (sng.)	eroi	heroes
Definite (pl.)	eroii	the heroes

Examples:

- **Copacul este foarte înalt.** (The tree is very tall.)
- **Mașina va veni peste o oră.** (The car will come in an hour.)
- **Tricoul este murdar.** (The t-shirt is dirty.)

Notes: In some instances the Romanian definite articles must be used, though they will not be used in English.

1. When we speak about something in general:
 - **Viața este foarte diferită.** (Life is very different.)
 - **Îmi place cafeaua foarte mult.** (I like coffee very much.)
2. When showing possession:
 - **Fratel meu este doctor.** (My brother is a doctor.)
 - **Trenul tău pleacă mâine.** (Your train leaves tomorrow.)
